It is 9:03 on Tuesday, April 20th, 2021. I call this meeting of the Independent 6 7 Redistricting Commission to order. 8 For the record, the administrative assistant will 9 be taking roll. When your name is called, please indicate 10 that you are present; if you're unable to respond verbally, 11 we ask that you please type your name. 12 Yasmin, please. 13 MS. RAMOS: Thank you, Madam Chair. 14 Vice Chair Watchman. 15 VICE CHAIR WATCHMAN: Present. 16 MS. RAMOS: Commissioner Lerner. 17 COMMISSIONER LERNER: Present. 18 MS. RAMOS: Commissioner Mehl. 19 COMMISSIONER MEHL: Present. 20 MS. RAMOS: Commissioner York. 21 COMMISSIONER YORK: Present. 22 MS. RAMOS: Chair Neuberg. 23 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Present. 24 MS. RAMOS: And for the record, we also have Roy 25 Herrera from Ballard Spahr; Daniel Arellano from Ballard

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Spahr; Eric Spencer from Snell & Wilmer. 1 2 We also have our Executive Director, Brian Schmitt, 3 and Angela Miller be transcribing for us today; and from ADOA, we have Michael Hillebrand, Nicole Sornsin; and 4 5 Jessica Klein for the AG's Office who will be representing 6 ADOA. 7 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Thank you. And thank you, everybody, for -- for joining us and 8 9 welcome to our new representation. It's really wonderful to 10 see you around the table and -- and, you know, have you part 11 of the process. 12 Please note for the record that -- and for the 13 minutes -- that a quorum is present. 14 Item I(B) call for notice. 15 Yasmin, was the notice and agenda for the 16 Commission meeting properly posted 48 hours in advance of 17 today's meeting? MS. RAMOS: Yes, it was. 18 19 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Okay. Thank you very much. 20 With that, we'll move to Agenda Item No. II, 21 approval of minutes from April 13th, 2021, last week. 22 We do recognize that, once again, we are putting 23 forth the video recording of both sessions which fulfills 24 the statutory requirements. We do have the intention of moving forward with written minutes. I think at the end of 25

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the meeting today, you'll understand why we have not yet had 1 the bandwidth from a personnel perspective to get that done. 2 3 But, with that, I'd like to entertain a motion to approve the minutes, the video recording of the general 4 5 session and executive session recordings from last week, 6 April 13th. 7 COMMISSIONER LERNER: This is Commissioner Lerner. 8 I move to approve the minutes. 9 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Do I have a second? 10 COMMISSIONER MEAL: Commissioner Mehl. I second. 11 COMMISSIONER YORK: This is Commission --12 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Commissioner Mehl, please. COMMISSIONER MEHL: Commissioner Mehl seconds. 13 14 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Any further discussion? 15 With that, we will do a vote. 16 Commissioner Watchman. 17 COMMISSIONER WATCHMAN: Aye. CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Commissioner Mehl. 18 19 COMMISSIONER MEHL: Aye. 20 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Commissioner Lerner. 21 COMMISSIONER LERNER: Aye. 22 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Commissioner York. 23 COMMISSIONER YORK: Aye. 24 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Commissioner Neuberg is an 25 aye.

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And, with that, the general session and executive session minutes from April 13th, 2021, have been approved.

We will move to Agenda Item No. III, opportunity for public comments.

Public comments will open for a minimum of 30 minutes and remain open until the adjournment of the meeting. Comments will only be accepted electronically in writing on the link provided in the notice and agenda for this public meeting, and will be limited to 3,000 characters.

Please note members of Commission may not discuss items that are not specifically identified on the agenda. Therefore, pursuant A.R.S. 38-403.01(H), action taken as a result of public comment will be limited to directing staff to study the matter, responding to any criticism, or scheduling the matter for further consideration and decision at a later date.

18 With that, we move to Agenda No. XIV -- I'm sorry, 19 XIV -- IV, discussion on public comments received prior to 20 today's meeting of April 20th.

I turn it over to my fellow Commissioners if they have any feedback or comments they'd like to make. COMMISSIONER LERNER: This is Commissioner Lerner. I'll just note that we so appreciate, especially last week in some cases there was pretty good in-depth

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thoughtful comments that were a little bit analytical about some of the things we were talking about, and it gives a different perspective. So I thought those were helpful to hear different perspectives than what we normally get from our own views.

So I just wanted to say thank you.

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COMMISSIONER MEHL: The comments have been very robust. They have been very varied, a lot of different perspectives. We are certainly reading them and paying attention to them, and so I appreciate those people who have sent public comments and thank you.

COMMISSIONER YORK: This is Commissioner York. I echo Commissioner Mehl and Commissioner Lerner's comments.

CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: I agree. I'll tell you what -- what spoke out to me.

I mean, I think Commissioner Mehl said "robust." There is, I think, pretty significant concern and disagreement with what mapping firm might be the best fit for us. There's three and so with that, you know, there's never any perfect fit, but we've heard specifically all concerns, and we'll take that in mind when we meet with the firms later today.

We heard about a desire for 24/7 access for feedback; that does exist. So if you go to our website and you click on "Contact Us," those messages get to us. We

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received them this week.

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A desire, again, to understand even if all Commissioners are not responsible for documenting every conversation we have, that that leaves an imprint, you know, in our learning process. The community wants to know as much as possible how it is that we arrive at the -- at our decisions, which is valid and understood.

I heard the importance of accessing rural communities, Native American communities, that will be particularly important with -- with the lack -- potentially in some areas, the lack of Wi-Fi.

12 And I also heard somebody -- and maybe it was more 13 than one person -- have a little bit of concern with my use 14 of the word "expediency." I appreciated reading that because I want to allay, you know, concerns that, yes, I'm 15 16 somebody that likes to be efficient, this is a timely, very 17 intense process, but -- but we will not cut corners. And, please, I'll be careful about my word. We will do our due 18 19 diligence to do it right.

So that's my sense. If there's no other feedback, we can move on to Agenda Item No. V.

We're not quite ready for that; that's going to be the discussion and possible action on the options for mapping consultants. As I alluded to earlier, these presentations will be done in executive session as is

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1 required to protect the integrity of the competitive process of -- of the RFP. 2 3 We will return to Agenda Item No. V at about 9:25, when it approaches the time of our first interview, which I 4 5 believe is with Haystaq. 6 With that, we will move to Item No. VI, which is 7 Executive Director's report and discussion thereof. 8 If we do need to interrupt this conversation, you 9 know, to turn it -- to get ready for the interview, that's 10 fine; I'll mind the time. But with that, I would like to 11 turn it over to our Executive Director, Brian Schmitt. 12 DIRECTOR SCHMITT: Thank you, Chairwoman Neuberg. 13 Yasmin, will you put up the presentation? 14 Thank you. 15 So, briefly I'm going to go over some just history 16 of spending from the previous Commission in their first 17 year, year and a half. You'll see here their largest expense year one was 18 19 legal fees; they were about 1.2 million dollars and 47 20 percent of their budget. Next largest was mapping services 21 and software at 921,000 and about 22 percent of their 22 budget. Their public hearings and Commission meetings cost about 446,000 and 10 percent of their budget; and then other 23 operating cost, like staff and office and all those kinds of 24 25 things, were about 900,000 or 21 percent of their budget for

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a total of \$4.2 million.

Thank you.

So these are their previous appropriations kind of laid out by year, what they were appropriated initially in the blue and then their supplemental was in red, and then one year they had to go back for a second supplemental so that is in yellow. And they ended up spending about \$12 million in total of the years.

9 All right. I'm going to do a brief overview of the 10 legislative budget process. Typically state agencies 11 prepare their budget request and submit them to the 12 Governor's Office of Strategic Planning and Budget by 13 September 1st for the following fiscal year. During the 14 fall, OSPB and the joint legislature budget committee review 15 those requests. The Governor must produce a budget within 16 five days of the start of each regular session of the 17 legislature.

The JLBC staff produces a baseline document which reflects the four sector consensus economic forecast and spending estimates based on funding formula requirements and other obligations.

After that, the legislature conducts hearings, usually in January and February. The primary budget bill is called the General Appropriation Bill, but the budget package also typically consists of capital outlay bills and

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budget reconciliation bills.

Once approved by the House and Senate, the budget bills are sent to the Governor; the Governor may sign the bills, let them go into effect without a signature, or veto the bills. The General Appropriation Act takes effect immediately, then most appropriations are for fiscal year that begins the upcoming July 1st.

And here just general updates from the office. The office we're currently in, we may be moving. I'm working with ADOA to figure that situation out, they're doing -they're adjusting some of their needs in this building and if they do need to move us, then they will build a space out for us just down the hall.

What's nice about the current office is it was an agency that got absorbed by DOI, and so they left all their furniture and copier and printer, so we -- we are taking that over.

18 We're just getting set up with phones and computers 19 and that kind of stuff.

Kind of future items that we'll talk about more in depth next week are our budget in general, what we think our needs will be. We've been working with the attorneys to develop policies, procedures, and trainings so we'll have more information on that; put together an organization -organizational chart and some job descriptions so we can

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talk through staffing and see what you all think would be best. And then just IT in general after having conversation with attorneys, I think it's something we'll have to address as a whole.

And if you have any questions, I'd be happy to answer them.

COMMISSIONER LERNER: Brian, this is Commissioner Lerner.

Can you speak a little bit more to the budget and where -- and where we are with it in this point in terms of requesting additional -- funds.

DIRECTOR SCHMITT: Sure. So -- sure.

13 So last week I spoke with our attorneys and they 14 lay out kind of an estimated budget on -- on their side, and I backfilled it with the previous Commission's costs just to 15 16 kind of get a rough ballpark figure. It's higher than what 17 the Governor's proposal is so I've been speaking with them just about some of our needs and what we're looking at, and 18 so we're still kind of working with that; but they seemed 19 20 open to maybe an increased amount depending on what we 21 finalize as our needs.

COMMISSIONER LERNER: Thank you.

VICE CHAIR WATCHMAN: So, Madam Chair, okay, Brian, so I know the legislature is meeting right now, how much time do we have left to get this information over to, I

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guess, the Governor's Office and the legislature? What's 1 the time frame? 2 3 DIRECTOR SCHMITT: So next week at next week's meeting when we address all the needs of --that the 4 5 Commission thinks we need, I think after that then we can go with a more finalized plan to them. 6 7 It didn't seem from my conversations like they were in a rush, but it's better to get it on the radar sooner 8 9 rather than later with the specific request. So 10 negotiations are ongoing. 11 VICE CHAIR WATCHMAN: Thank you. 12 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Yeah, you know what, I 13 participated in -- in -- on -- on the call with the 14 attorneys, and in my conversations with Brian, you know, I -- I'm very hopeful/optimistic about the budget. 15 16 Just foreshadowing for our conversation next week, 17 you know, it's ten years later, I think we should expect, you know, a budget that is significantly more than the 18 19 numbers that we've talked about. I think we can expect 20 great receptivity from -- from the Governor and the 21 legislature because I think we're making responsible, good 22 I think we could justify everything that we're hires. 23 asking for, and there's nothing yet that has come up that's 24 communicated to us that -- that there's going to be a major 25 headwinds.

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1 With that, I mean we're not prepared to present 2 specific numbers today; I think you could expect those 3 numbers next week. Brian and I also are getting ready to, you know, be 4 able to meet with, you know, state legislators or anybody 5 6 involved in the budgeting process that would like to better 7 understand and be educated about why it's essential that we 8 spend the money upfront to do things in the right way. But I think you'll -- you'll get very specific 9 10 numbers next week with a specific plan in place. Basically 11 our goal is to not have to go back for supplemental funding 12 midway through the year but, rather, because we're catching 13 the appropriation process before it's finished, to actually 14 get the full funding done now. 15 Roughly on average, the state legislature tends to 16 vote late May. So -- so we have the time. But, you know, 17 but we don't have a lot of time. COMMISSIONER YORK: Are you going to --18 19 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Any other questions of Brian? 20 COMMISSIONER YORK: Yeah, is he going to comment on 21 the executive assistant role? 22 DIRECTOR SCHMITT: Yeah, there is an item a little later in the agenda that we'll talk through that. 23 24 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Right. Right after this 25 agenda item, the next agenda item is going to be the

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specific conversations about hiring of executive assistant and fleshing out all other staff positions.

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I think we're going to have a logical break time in the next couple minutes so I don't think we should go into that. I think just in the -- in the next two minutes, if there's any remaining questions of Brian with regard to the specific content of his report -- and if nobody has any other questions, Brian, I mean, I don't know if you want to share with everybody what you're spending the time doing because I know you're working around the clock.

DIRECTOR SCHMITT: It's all been everything. Just making sure that the office is getting set up so once we have other employees, they're ready to go and can hit the ground running; trying to plan out and look at the budget and see what we act might actually need; and then also setting what they've done in the past, too, to see what we can glean from that, so.

A little bit of everything.

CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: It's a big learning curve.

All right. Well, this is a logical breaking point. I believe that we need to exit this meeting and enter into the executive session link to prepare for our 9:30 meeting with Haystaq.

24Yasmin, am I correct on that front?25MS. RAMOS: Yes. They will -- yes. They will

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begin at 9:30.

CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Okay. And to the attorneys around the table, do I need to have a motion to move -- yes, I do need a motion to move into executive session for Item No. V.

We are going to move to Agenda Item No. V, which is discussion and possible action on options for mapping consultants. We have two parts to this agenda: (A), which is the oral presentations; and then (B), if we can get to it, the scoring and evaluation of the applicants.

The Commission will be going into executive session which will not be open to the public for the purpose of obtaining legal advice, A.R.S. 38-431.03(A)(3), as well as for the purpose of discussion or consideration of records exempt by law from public inspection, including the receipt and discussion of information or testimony that is specifically required to be maintained as confidential by state or federal law, A.R.S. 38-431.03(A)(2).

Pursuant to A.R.S. 41.2534(D), the content of proposals submitted under the State's request for proposal procurement process is confidential until contract award so as to avoid disclosure of contents prejudic- -- prejudicial to competing offers during the process of negotiation.

With that, I will need a motion to go into executive session. And to reiterate to the public, for the

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protection of the State's interest, we keep the -- the process, the RFP process, confidential such that there aren't any biases that one company can take advantage of over the other. With that, can I entertain a motion to move into

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executive session?

7 COMMISSIONER LERNER: This is Commissioner Lerner. 8 I move that we go into executive session. CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Do I have a second? 9 10 VICE CHAIR WATCHMAN: Vice Chair Watchman seconds. 11 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Any discussion? 12 Okay, a vote. Commissioner Watchman. 13 COMMISSIONER WATCHMAN: Ave. 14 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Commissioner Mehl. 15 COMMISSIONER MEHL: Aye. 16 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Commissioner Lerner. 17 COMMISSIONER LERNER: Aye. CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Commissioner York. 18 19 COMMISSIONER YORK: Aye. 20 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Commissioner Neuberg is an 21 aye. 22 With that, we will move into exec- -- executive 23 session. Make sure you exit this link, enter a new link. 24 And with regard to the public expectation, 25 potentially around 10:30 we expect to resume in public

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session, but that is an estimate, and it is all subject to 1 2 change. 3 Thank you. (Whereupon the proceeding is in executive session 4 from 9:27 a.m. until 10:44 p.m.) 5 6 + + + + +7 8 9 (Whereupon the proceeding resumes in general 10 session.) 11 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Okay. I do think we have our 12 core team assembled and our Commissioners, so welcome back 13 to the public meeting. Thank you everybody's patience. 14 We had the pleasure and honor of interviewing 15 HaystagDNA; it was a very productive conversation. 16 And, with that, we had a very clean break in our 17 agenda; we finished up Agenda Item No. VI, which was Brian Schmitt's Executive Director report. 18 19 And we'll move now into Agenda Item No. VII, which 20 is discussion and possible action on executive assistant, 21 public information officer, and other potential 22 administrative support positions and duties of all IRC staff 23 positions. 24 And as a note to the public, the Commission may -may vote to go into executive session which will not be open 25

to the public for the purpose of obtaining legal advice pursuant A.R.S. 38-431.03(A)(3).

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With that, as we begin to discuss where we are in our hiring and the Commission's needs, I just want to set a broader context, which is that -- I think we're at a crescendo where we're on the cusp of hiring mapping and moving into really the meat of what we're doing. Things are going to move very fast.

9 Just as an example, as a teaser, we need to think 10 through our travel schedule for all of the public meetings 11 for the sake of getting IT and logistical details worked 12 out; the right size of the location. There are so many 13 nuances and things that we need to get moving on, that as we 14 discuss these particular positions, I just want everybody in the mindset of understanding the amount of work that all is 15 16 descending on us in the next couple of weeks.

With that, Brian, do you want to share a little bit where we're at with the hiring and -- and what you feel our needs are?

20 DIRECTOR SCHMITT: Sure, absolutely. So I went 21 through the interview process with four out of six we 22 narrowed it down to.

I talked through interview questions with
 Commissioner Lerner and -- and got input from her and
 Commissioner York as well.

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I have narrowed it down to -- to one and would like to move forward. There was a question when I was discussing with legal counsel if we can talk about it in public or if it has to be executive session. So if they could address that, I would appreciate it.

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MR. SPENCER: Commissioners, can you hear me? CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Yes.

MR. SPENCER: This is Eric Spencer in the legal room here.

10 If it's an employment or HR related matter that is 11 confidential in nature you have to ability to go into 12 executive session to discuss that. So it's really up to 13 you, Brian, whether you're just going to make a public 14 pronouncement about who you've chosen and the Commission will ratify it, that could be done in public; but if you 15 16 need to discuss sensitive issues related to that person, 17 that -- that's probably better to go to in executive 18 session.

19DIRECTOR SCHMITT: I'm comfortable with either, so20if the Commission has a preference.

CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: At minimum I would like you to outline your thinking and your rationale and -- and all of that in public, and -- and so maybe we can start in public and then if fellow Commissions have additional questions or, you know, follow-up, we can then make a motion

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to move into executive session.

DIRECTOR SCHMITT: Great.

So I was really looking for a candidate who had knowledge of the state systems, could hit the ground running. I was attracted to having a sense of working in a legal environment. Just kind of having a grasp on what the project would be.

Someone with a history of starting up an office and the ability to on day one just be a team player, and that's what kind of led me to the final candidate.

CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Okav.

COMMISSIONER MEHL: Is it appropriate for you to just say who the candidate is and what their background is just generally?

DIRECTOR SCHMITT: Sure. It was an executive assistant to the U.S. Attorney and the Deputy Chief Attorney General.

CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Yeah, if there's sensitive 18 19 information about protecting the identity or reputation of 20 this candidate, then -- then that's the point that I would like a motion to go into executive session.

So I defer to our counsel here about the boundaries of -- of what to address publicly versus in executive session.

VICE CHAIR WATCHMAN: Madam Chair, this is Derrick

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Watchman.

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2 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Yes. 3 VICE CHAIR WATCHMAN: What about sharing the number? We had a list of candidates and the respective 4 number in the list, and maybe -- maybe Brian can kind of 5 6 share that with us so I can go to my list of candidates and 7 see who this individual is. 8 DIRECTOR SCHMITT: Let me pull up that list really 9 quick. 10 COMMISSIONER LERNER: Chair Neuberg? 11 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Yes. 12 COMMISSIONER LERNER: I mean, is it -- one of the things that we discussed is that our Executive Director 13 14 would consult with Commissioners, and then when it was time 15 to come back, make a recommendation, and that the 16 Commissioners would then make a final approval. So I feel 17 that he has done -- done that, he has been consulting with Commissioners. 18 19 All for giving the number so people can look at 20 that, but is it appropriate at this time and is it ok at 21 this time to say: This is who I recommend? He's now giving 22 us some background, people can look that person up on the 23 list, and then we could -- he could ask for a 24 recommendation. Are we able to do that? 25 DIRECTOR SCHMITT: Yes. It's number 23.

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COMMISSIONER MEHL: And, Brian, is it appropriate just to say who the candidate is and to ask us if we're willing to support that nominee?

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DIRECTOR SCHMITT: Eric or Roy, just want to verify with you two beforehand.

MR. SPENCER: I think the safer thing would be to -- this is Eric Spencer, by the way -- to go into executive session to discuss it preliminary. I note right now we're on Item VII, which is not the discussion of HR related confidential information, it's under Item VIII. So my recommendation would be to move to Item VIII on the agenda, make a motion to go into executive session, and then discuss these more personal details in executive session first before we come back out in public.

CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: We can absolutely do that. I just want to mention that there are additional staff positions that we need to address today in public session as well. So -- so in some ways, maybe we want to bifurcate the executive assistant position and the public information officer position, both of which the job positions have been posted, and we're well along the way, and then there will be discussion potentially of additional positions.

And so discussing the specific position of executive assistant, does anybody want to share anything else about the other positions before we vote to go into

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executive session to address the -- the specifics of the EA position?

COMMISSIONER LERNER: This is Commissioner Lerner. We're on Item VIII, correct, so --

CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: VII. VII and VIII are -bleed into each other --

COMMISSIONER LERNER: Right.

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CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: -- and so we're technically on Agenda Item No. VII, but it touches upon the Agenda Item No. VIII.

COMMISSIONER LERNER: Okay. So I guess I'm unclear exactly. I mean, at some point we do -- I think we need to move forward on the executive assistant, and at some point we do need to talk about exactly what we're looking for with the public information officer so if that's something we need to do in executive session, I'm all for moving over to that.

18 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Okay. With that, do I have a 19 motion to move to executive session for the purpose of 20 discussing these hires?

And just in terms of making clear to the public the justification, it is for the purpose of obtaining legal advice from counsel with respect to proposed administrative support positions, which may include the hiring process for staff positions and/or defining the duties of staff

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positions.

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And I'd also like to reiterate given that the Items 2 NO. VII and VIII are bleeding into each other, that we may 3 also be seeking counsel regarding confidential 4 5 employment-related information with respect to proposed 6 staff candidates for executive assistant and public 7 information officer. This is to protect the identification 8 and reputation of those who are applying. 9 So, with that, do I have a motion to go into 10 executive session? 11 COMMISSIONER LERNER: This is Commissioner Lerner. 12 I move to go into executive session. CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Do I have a second? 13 14 COMMISSIONER MEHL: Commissioner Mehl seconds. 15 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Okay. Any further 16 discussion? 17 Commissioner Watchman. COMMISSIONER WATCHMAN: 18 Ave. 19 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Commissioner Mehl. 20 COMMISSIONER MEHL: Aye. CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Commissioner Lerner. 21 22 COMMISSIONER LERNER: Aye. 23 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Commissioner York. 24 COMMISSIONER YORK: Aye. CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Commissioner Neuberg is an 25

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1 aye. 2 And, with that, we will move to executive session. 3 And I do not expect this to take -- well, I -- you know, maybe 15 minutes or so to the public, but we'll see you 4 5 soon. 6 (Whereupon the proceeding is in executive session 7 from 10:56 a.m. until 11:09 a.m.) 8 * * * * * 9 10 11 (Whereupon the proceeding resumes in general 12 session.) 13 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Hi, everybody. We are 14 waiting for the counsel to rejoin us from executive 15 session. Thank you for everybody's patience. 16 Okay. I see that our counsel has joined us, 17 and I see all Commissioners. Yasmin, I don't -- Angela is here. I see 18 19 our transcriptionist. 20 And, with that, we will jump back in to our 21 public -- public session. Thank you, everybody, for 22 your patience. 23 We are on Agenda Item No. VII and VIII 24 addressing the hires of the IRC. I would like to turn it over to Brian. I believe that he has a 25

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clarification or an announcement to -- to propose.

DIRECTOR SCHMITT: Thank you, Chairwoman, and thank you, Commission, for all of your help and input throughout this process.

Our -- the candidate I recommend is Valerie Newman for the executive assistant position.

CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: And -- and can you share, Brian, a little bit about the highlights and -- and what it is about this particular candidate that -- that you were attracted to?

DIRECTOR SCHMITT: Absolutely. Before, I mentioned this briefly, she was executive assistant to the U.S. Attorney, before that she was executive assistant to the Chief Deputy Attorney General. She was the only one who really acknowledged that we're -- we're starting from scratch; she was very succinct and just seems like she would be a great addition.

18 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: And -- and her technical 19 skills, what -- what did you see in terms of what she 20 brought to the table? 21 DIRECTOR SCHMITT: She's extremely organized --

sorry. I have guests in the office. CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Sorry.

DIRECTOR SCHMITT: Sorry.

Sorry about that.

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She's extremely organized, thoughtful, meticulous, 1 has great knowledge of the State from when she was there for 2 3 four years; and will be someone who will be a big help. CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Any questions of Brian with 4 5 this particular candidate to hire as our executive 6 assistant? 7 I'd like to entertain a motion to, you know, move to hire -- I'm sorry what -- what is her name? 8 9 DIRECTOR SCHMITT: Valerie Newman. 10 VICE CHAIR WATCHMAN: Valerie Newman. 11 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Valerie Newman to be our 12 executive assistant. 13 VICE CHAIR WATCHMAN: Madam Chair, this is 14 Vice Chair Watchman. 15 I would like to make a motion to allow and approve 16 the hiring of Valerie Newman for the Commission and to work 17 with Mr. Schmitt. Thank you. CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Do we have a second? 18 19 COMMISSIONER YORK: This is Commissioner York. 20 I second that motion. 21 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Any further discussion? 22 Okay. With that, Commissioner Watchman. 23 COMMISSIONER WATCHMAN: Aye. 24 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Commissioner Mehl. 25 COMMISSIONER MEHL: Aye.

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CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Commissioner Lerner. 1 2 COMMISSIONER LERNER: Aye. 3 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Commissioner York. 4 COMMISSIONER YORK: Aye. CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Commissioner Neuberg is an 5 6 aye. And, with that, we welcome Valerie Newman to our 7 staff. 8 9 And, Brian, regarding our public information 10 officer, where do we stand and what is our next step? 11 DIRECTOR SCHMITT: So we received 37 applications 12 for the PIO positions. I'm going to narrow it down over the 13 next day or two and try to get interviews scheduled so by 14 next week I can present you guys either my final choice or 15 final two choices. 16 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: And -- and for the sake of 17 the public, can we clarify what level of oversight is occurring with the Commissioner? I know, you know, several 18 19 Commissioners are highly involved in sifting through the 20 applications, and I don't know if anybody wants to chime in 21 here just with our overall oversight of process. This is Commissioner Lerner. 22 COMMISSIONER LERNER:

We are all provided with the applications; we review those applications. We provide our Executive Director with feedback on the applications and feedback on

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questions that are used in the interview process, and the Executive Director moves forward with his interviews. And then at least based on the past experience, this recent experience, he gets back in touch about what his views are and provides input as well -- asks for input as well.

So a lot of give and take, a lot of discussion is provided between the Commissioners and the Executive Director about the individuals that are under consideration and -- and his recommendation.

CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Thank you.

I -- I thank my fellow Commissioners for their due diligence on this; and -- and I thank Brian for your willingness to have many cooks in the kitchen.

DIRECTOR SCHMITT: Absolutely. Thank you all. Really, thank you for the input. I do appreciate it; it's great to have.

So thank you.

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CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: And as a -- and as foreshadowing for our next meeting, and there is no action to be taken right now, as we're fleshing out our staff, I want to highlight for the Commissioners to begin to think about three other positions that I think will become relevant, like, very fast as in, you know, now.

One is related to the PIO is community outreach. And so with the public information officer, I think it's

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just going to be a huge task. Having somebody that is uniquely attuned to our communities of interest, you know, the communication and coordination I think will be important.

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IT. You know, there's just so many complexities to everything we're doing, and as we're plotting out our travel schedule for the summer with our public hearings, we can't do that without an IT expert to be coaching us about what locations are feasible and what we would need to anticipate.

You know, a public records expert and we may, you know, think about collapsing this into a deputy director position. We're hearing from our attorneys and we heard today, you know, and will continue to hear from our mapping consultants, that we're going to be required to produce every step of every decision we ever make. And so, with that, you need an ability to preserve public records, mark them, and make them easily accessible to courts to anybody who is asking.

And -- and the reason why I bring this up, we're 19 not ready to actually talk about the specific positions. Ι do want to foreshadow for my partners here that, as I mentioned before, we're at a crescendo. For all of these elements to work well together, we need to make sure we have 23 the people power in place to facilitate what we need. This will be a minuscule part of our budget.

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1 Minuscule. But it's an important quality control. 2 And -- and with that, again, we don't have any 3 other specific items to agree on -- or -- or debate today, 4 but next week please be prepared to be coming together to 5 talk through the various hires and how we may carve out the 6 levels of -- of responsibility. 7 Any other questions, feedback, thoughts before we 8 move on to Agenda Item No. IX? COMMISSIONER MEHL: This is Commissioner Mehl. 9 Ι 10 have one question for Brian. 11 What would be the expected start date? How much 12 notice is Valerie going to need to give and when do you think she will be on board? 13 14 DIRECTOR SCHMITT: She will be on board May 4th. 15 COMMISSIONER MEHL: Thank you. 16 And, you know, Commissioner CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: 17 Mehl, I think your question actually highlights something that we all need to be cognizant of, and that is that 18 19 everything that we do is two weeks out. Meaning that as we 20 do our hires, people need to give notice, and -- and there's 21 time for onboarding. And I know -- you know, I think 22 there's a pressure of -- of getting our job done. VICE CHAIR WATCHMAN: Madam Chair. This is 23 24 Vice Chair Watchman. I have another question. 25 You mentioned three other potential positions. Ι

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think we only have three budgeted slots and so do we need to advance a request to whomever to allow for these additional positions to be included in our budget? I'm not sure how that works.

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I did talk to Brian a little bit earlier, but just curious as to how we're going to officially launch more positions.

B DIRECTOR SCHMITT: Thanks, Commissioner Watchman. So the process for getting more FTEs, full-time equivalent positions is that we petition JLBC and the Office of Strategic Planning and Budget, OSPB, and they grant them or they don't. I'm guessing from the conversations that I've had that it -- it wouldn't get -- we wouldn't get push back if we were adding a few positions.

And so -- and part of the conversations going on is including more positions in next year's budget -- or this year's budget.

18 VICE CHAIR WATCHMAN: Yeah, makes sense. Thank19 you.

CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: And I want to reassure everybody, because we're all conscious of the budget, these hires and the way we're thinking about things is with the intention of saving us money down the road.

To the extent that we staff ourselves now and hire ourselves appropriately, we can withstand some of the

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challenges and some of the complications that may present themselves down the road; and so I think it's a very smart investment, and why I'm optimistic about just receiving a positive response to our requests on the budget.

If there's no further conversation on Agenda Item No. VII and VIII with our hires, we'll move on to Agenda Item No. IX, discussion on data census delays and ways to mitigate its disruption.

Outside of our hiring I have nothing to offer here unless our counsel or fellow Commissioners have something they want to chime in with.

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13 VICE CHAIR WATCHMAN: Well, Madam Chair, this is 14 Vice Chair Watchman.

In our -- in our interview, the data is going to be available in August from what I'm hearing, and so -- the 17 data is -- is usable to start the process and it -- it sounds like the official U.S. Census data that's coming out the end of September, I guess, will be a more refined presentation; but what I'm hearing, it looks like August could be a go date, you know, to start the process. If I'm not mistaken.

23 And so I'm still unclear as to, you know, the data 24 is data from what I'm hearing, it's just a matter of how 25 it's formatted.

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And so based on that, it seems that we could start our work in August a little bit ahead of the official announcement. So I'm just trying to understand that given, if that's the case, you know, we can start work a little bit earlier and I'm just trying to qualify, you know, what that really means.

So just a concern that I have.

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CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: You know, thank you, Commissioner Watchman.

You know, I -- I think we're all keeping our eyes on the timeline. I'm -- I think there's a lot of options that we have.

13 Yes, there is some data that's going to be 14 presented to the states that with the appropriate 15 sophistication of our mapping consultants, they'll be able 16 to take advantage of. It's a language that is outdated; 17 but, there's also ACS data which is the American Community Survey data that we could potentially rely on. There's a 18 listening tour that we can embark on, which is anticipating 19 20 the potential difficult decision points that we have.

And so as it relates to mitigating, you know, the challenges, I'm optimistic that there's a lot that we can do as, you know, you alluded to in your question, and it's something that we're asking our mapping consultant applicants.

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But we're certainly not going to waste time. 1 We're 2 not going to wait until September 30th. 3 VICE CHAIR WATCHMAN: Got it. 4 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Any other comments or 5 questions? 6 Okay. With that, we'll move to Agenda Item No. X, 7 discussion on ADOA resources and updates. And, with that, I'll turn it over to Brian. 8 DIRECTOR SCHMITT: So I spoke a little bit before 9 10 about the office. Once I have more info and a more final 11 plan, I'll let you all know on that. 12 For those of you who ordered cell phones, I have 13 IT is going to set them up, and then I'll get them to them. 14 you. 15 I think that's all I have on ADOA update. 16 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Okay. Exciting about getting 17 our cell phones. Okay. With that, we'll move to Agenda Item No. XI, 18 19 which is update, discussion, and possible action on Howard 20 open meeting law complaint. 21 The Commission may vote to go into executive 22 session if we need to for the purpose of obtaining legal 23 I will clarify that explanation if necessary, but advice. 24 the good news is that that complaint has been dismissed. Ιt 25 was a complaint based on challenging the reasons for the

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Commission going into executive session on January 14th and 21st, and it was the Pinal County Attorney who gave a decision that the Commission did, in fact, have the authority to go into executive session.

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With that, we did allude to along the way that there may have been a second Howard complaint, we were waiting for that to arrive; we did discover that it was filed, it has actually already been litigated and dismissed. That was a March 16th complaint that questioned again the open meeting law, questioning whether the Commissioners were entitled to listen to, you know, references and opinions of other people in the community regarding our hires. And so we're appreciative that that was also dismissed.

I do want to let the public know that, that we understand the heart, the meaning, the essence of these complaints. We're -- we're glad that legally there was no merit, but we are doing our due diligence and making our best effort to do what we can in -- in the open and doing as much in the public eye as is responsible.

So -- so we appreciate your reminders, and you have our commitment to do what we can that is responsible.

Are there any questions regarding Agenda Item No. XI?

VICE CHAIR WATCHMAN: Yes, Madam Chair. This is Vice Chair Watchman.

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Is it possible to get copies of this -- this 1 2 documentation? I appreciate what you're sharing with me 3 but, you know, not to paper up everything, I'd like to have at least the documentation so I can read it for myself, you 4 5 know, get some thought proc- -- get my thoughts going on 6 what the Courts and why it was dismissed and some other Would be nice to have some documentation to review. 7 things. 8 So if we can get that, I'd really appreciate it. 9 DIRECTOR SCHMITT: We will absolutely get it for 10 you, Commissioner. 11 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: You got it. It's I imagine 12 -- and I'll wait for counsel to chime in, I imagine it's a 13 matter of public record as well. 14 Okay. I don't hear any counsel, but I do believe 15 it's a matter of public record and, yes, we will get that to 16 you. 17 MR. HERRERA: Madam Chairwoman, I'm sorry, we were 18 on mute. 19 It is. 20 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Okay. Thank you. 21 With that, we will move to Agenda Item No. XII, 22 which is discussion and possible action on speaking 23 engagement requests. 24 We are now, you know, building up to be doing quite 25 meaningful work, and we are starting to get a lot of

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requests to come and speak to different groups.

I, just for the sake of transparency, I want to let everybody know that I have committed to speak with the League of Women Voters on April 29th, and I think we should collectively as a group talk through what kind of boundaries or parameters we want to place on our decision-making.

I don't want to unilaterally decide which group I -- I speak with. I'd like to open it up to my fellow Commissioners as well if you're interested in getting out and about in the community, but I'd -- I'd like feedback about what -- what's right for our Commission and -- and to think through specific criteria: Number of people, partisanship; you know, anything. But I -- I really don't want to get in the position of having to personally say yes/no.

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What do you think?

COMMISSIONER LERNER: Chair Neuberg, I'll just say I -- I actually spoke to a charter school class; I didn't think about asking here first. It was a former student of mine who now teaches who asked me to come and speak to his classes about redistricting because that's part of what they were teaching. So, I -- I did that.

I believe we want to be as nonpartisan as possible, that's the way I approach. It was a learning process, let them ask questions. And I think that's -- I think it's

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great for us to be going out and speaking with different groups and explaining the process and what we're trying to do. So I'm real supportive of that, and I'm happy to participate in that.

I had a lot of fun with these high school students. They're pretty knowledgeable actually. My former student has done a really good job of prepping them.

So I think it's helpful to the public if they hear from us, and we're trying to do as much as possible as nonpartisan way as we can, even though I think we have that within us, I think as much as our discussion that we can do to explain what we're trying to accomplish is helpful. It's just part of that open process we're trying to do overall.

> So I'm real supportive of all of this. CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Okav. I --

HAIRPERSON NEOBERG. Okay. I --

VICE CHAIR WATCHMAN: Madam Chair.

CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: -- I love the support, but, you know, if we open all five of us to everything, we may not have time to do our work.

And so, with that, are there criteria, are there boundaries, are there guidelines that -- that people would like to suggest as we're sifting through the requests? VICE CHAIR WATCHMAN: Madam Chair.

CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: And let me let me give an example. So the attorneys actually said to me: Well, you

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know the legislative districts, each one has a Republican caucus, a democratic caucus; there's 30 of them, if you do both, there's 60 meetings.

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I mean, at what level do we -- and I'd like -- and the reason why I'm asking, maybe it seems, you know, immaterial, but actually I like -- I like an objective set of criteria 'cause I don't want to be biased. They can't all be nonpartisan. I mean, we have, what, 66 percent of our state is partisan. We want to talk to them.

VICE CHAIR WATCHMAN: Well, perhaps, Madam Chair, maybe a starting point is just getting -- getting legal advice, maybe some of the dos and don'ts, if -- if there's anything, from our legal counsel and then that will kind of set off more discussion.

CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: In terms of -- and I'll turn it over to the legal counsel.

Here's what I learn to date: We need to respect open meeting laws, obviously no work can be done in these environments; I want to protect confidentiality; we have to be mindful of ethics, meaning that as Commissioners we don't want to go be wined and dined in any particular environment. And we want to be mindful of our time to -- to maximize what we have to say and to be responsible, obviously, you know, to -- to be on -- we will be on the record.

And -- and so, with that, the legal counsel is

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actually asking the five of us to think through if we have beyond the legal constraints, ethical, you know, or just personal views of how to make those decisions.

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Given -- given that the attorneys say that they're all good choices. I mean -- and so let's just presume that it's already been vetted, the question is then we have limited time; we have an abundance of requests, all five of us will have requests. Brian and I probably to be honest will have the most. I want to represent all of us, so I want you to tell me what I should do.

COMMISSIONER MEHL: This is Chairman Mehl [sic].

I think it's hard in the abstract to -- to really say what we should be saying yes or no to. I think we should be cognizant of our -- our collective times. I think the larger groups that represent wide constituency are ones that we should most obviously be willing to go stand in front of and speak, and the smaller group like the legislative council or whatever, you know, we may want to be saying no to just for the matter of guarding our time.

But there will be some larger groups I think that will be pretty obvious that they would be beneficial to speak to. And most of what we're going to say is really describing the law and the process that people are not aware of.

COMMISSIONER LERNER: This is Commissioner Lerner.

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1 I -- I will agree with Commissioner Mehl as part of that. 2 I also think we need to take into account that we 3 will be holding public meetings so we want to factor that 4 into some of those requests, where at those public meetings 5 that will be another good opportunity for people to attend. 6 So when we're thinking about the districts that you 7 mentioned, both of you mentioned, that might be the thing to 8 say: Come to the meetings; come to the hearings. It's a chance to both provide input and hear about the process. 9 10 So -- so there might be a balancing act with some of that that we use once we schedule our statewide meetings 11 12 that we may be able to do that. 13 But I'm also I'm not sure how to make a decision on 14 what's right and what's wrong to say yes or no to exactly 15 without more specifics. 16 COMMISSIONER MEHL: And I think any one of us can 17 bring requests back to the group if you want an opinion as 18 to others as to whether we should be speaking with that 19 group or not, and I would trust each of our judgments if you 20 would want to make sure and want other feedback, we can do 21 that. 22 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: I appreciate that. Ιt 23 actually -- I mean, it may feel like a very small point, but 24 to be honest, it does feel a little confusing to me. You 25 know, just fielding the requests and -- and sifting through

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the specific requirements and -- and criteria. So I -- so I appreciate this very much.

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I'd also like to just be transparent that and I'd like to, you know, ask my fellow Commissioners, you know, Commissioner Lerner spoke about, you know, speaking to -- to a group of students. You know, that I'm real bullish on in terms of looking at the numbers of -- of, you know, a criteria, you know, to determine whether we'll, you know, give a public presentation, this is a once-in-a-decade opportunity for our state and the ability for us to, you know, tease some civics lessons and some opportunities for our youth to learn about government, to learn about our state. I -- I just think that that's one of the exciting wonderful parts of what we're doing.

So I may come back to you on this question; I don't hear a lot of consensus. I'm confused, but I'll continue the dialogue.

> COMMISSIONER YORK: Can I weigh in a little bit? CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Yes, please.

COMMISSIONER YORK: Commissioner York.

So what I'm hearing is that we all have consensus around educational events, and educating either high school students or the League of Women Voters on process; and so what I would suggest is we sort of tailor our public outreach to those sort of events and that we sort of try to

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avoid what I would call public opinion or public stance 1 2 events where we are asked to take a stance on -- on process 3 for how they -- how the Commission is working or ask to sort 4 of make decisions around what might influence people's 5 I think we need to keep sort of the Constitution and votes. sort of the educational side of the discussions. 6 7 COMMISSIONER LERNER: This is --8 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: I think -- I think, 9 Commissioner York, what I'm really hearing is -- is your 10 sensitivity and commitment to not violating open meeting 11 laws, which is not doing any business. Not -- not 12 translating, you know, or foreshadowing or giving any sense 13 of the work ahead or how we're thinking about anything, but 14 merely providing, you know, educational material and substantive, you know, clarifications such that will people 15 16 understand who we are, what we're doing, and -- and the 17 unique I think redistricting, you know, realities of 18 Arizona. 19 Okay. 20 I agree with all of that as COMMISSIONER LERNER: 21 well. 22 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Okay. If there's no other 23 further comments on that item, we'll move to Agenda Item No. 24 XIII, which is discussion of future agenda item requests. 25 Just by virtue of the meeting today, I know that we

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will need to address additional hires; we will be fleshing out our budget. I believe that our legal counsel will desire to do some training, which is in our best interest.

I'd like to add maybe potentially beginning to flesh out a travel schedule. The reason being, again, the logistics that are required around travel; it's not just our schedule, it's securing locations that can accommodate the public, the IT needs, and the thought behind who -- who has Internet, who doesn't have Internet, and how we access the populations.

That's what's on my mind.

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Additional thoughts about future agenda items? COMMISSIONER LERNER: Chair Neuberg, would we be also potentially still talking about the mapping?

CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Yes. That -- that -- you know what, to be honest, the majority of our agenda will I think be carried over. I do not expect that we're going to be finished with the mapping process, and so I expect that will be carried over.

20 We'll for sure want to hear our director's report; 21 we'll have additional detail with hires.

COMMISSIONER YORK: I would also suggest that Item XI has been complete.

24CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Yes. The Howard complaint is25done.

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COMMISSIONER YORK: So that can come on off. Okay.

CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Okay. Anything else to add with additional future agenda items?

Okay. With that, we will move to Agenda Item No. XIV, which is discussion and possible action on the scheduling of future meetings.

We have our Tuesdays carved out, with the expectation that we will be recessing every Tuesday from noon to 1:00 unless otherwise instructed; and I have no additional updates regarding our schedule as long as everybody protects those hours and protects the full day. We have an eight-hour line and the business is only going to get more robust as -- as we move forward.

Okay. With that, we can move on to Agenda Item No. XV, announcements.

Our next meeting date is going to be April 27th, 9:00 a.m.; and, again, the agenda to be determined, and I would plot out a full, robust day.

Any conflicts with next week?

With that, we'll move to Agenda Item No. XVI, which is the closing of public comments.

Please note members of the Commission may not discuss items that are not specifically identified on the agenda. Therefore, pursuant to A.R.S. 38-431.01(H), action

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taken as a result of public comment will be limited to directing staff to study the matter, responding to any criticism, or scheduling the matter for further consideration and decision at a later date.

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With that, our public comments are closed.

MS. RAMOS: So, Commissioner Neuberg -- Chair Neuberg.

CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Yes.

MS. RAMOS: Sorry about that. Since we are continuing to the afternoon session, they won't have the opportunity to comment then either? Sorry.

CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Well, that -- that -- okay. You know what, Yasmin, thank you for chiming in because I do not believe we want to close the public meeting.

The rest of our agenda relates to Agenda Item No., I believe, V, which is our work with meeting with and interviewing the mapping consultants.

I -- I will rely on our counsel here. 18 I'm 19 presuming that we need to keep the meeting open and that, at 20 the conclusion, at the end of the day of our interviews, we 21 will come back into public meeting to formally adjourn. 22 But -- but we are at this juncture where we have officially concluded the business that the five Commissioners intended 23 24 to deliberate with the exception of our mapping work. 25 MR. HERRERA: Madam Chairwoman, this is

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1 Mr. Herrera. I would wait until closing of the public 2 comments until we're end of the meeting today until after we 3 are finished with Item V. CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Okay. And so since I 4 5 erroneously or mistakenly closed public comments, what do I 6 do to reopen them? 7 COMMISSIONER YORK: You can just reopen 'em. CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Do I need a motion? 8 MS. RAMOS: I didn't close them because I had that 9 10 question, so they have never been closed. 11 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Oh. Okay. Well, since I 12 warned the public that we were closing them and we did not 13 close them, the public comments are still open. We 14 anticipate that they will be open until the adjournment of 15 our public meeting. 16 With the feedback of our counsel, the rest of our 17 deliberative work today is likely to be done in executive session, but I believe that we do need to return back to 18 19 public session to close the meeting. 20 And so would it be fair to say at this point that 21 we'll recess, reconvene in -- in executive session at 22 1:00 p.m. for our next mapping appointment, which if 23 somebody has the schedule -- which is with Taylor English. 24 COMMISSIONER YORK: We should reconvene at 12:55, I 25 believe.
