We move to Agenda Item No. II, approval of minutes from May 4th, 2021.

Thank you, Valerie, for providing written minutes for both the general session and the executive session. I do have a question for counsel and my colleagues. We have been using transcripts in the past, which fulfill our statutory requirements for minutes. What is it that we would like to propose to serve as our official minutes? If we do both we have to legally ensure that both are legally sound, meaning, you know, transcripts -- the video recordings -- I'm sorry if I used the wrong language. The video recordings are responsible for watching from beginning to end to ensure there is no interruption. So I don't know if legal counsel wants to chime in or my colleagues about which minutes we want to propose.

MR. JOHNSON: Is the question whether the

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And, again, thank you, Val, for stepping up. We really appreciate it. And welcome. We're really excited.

With that, we'll move to Agenda Item Number III, opportunity for public comments. Public comments will open for a minimum of 30 minutes and remain open until the adjournment of the meeting. Comments will only be accepted electronically in writing on the link provided in the notice and agenda for this public meeting and will be limited to 3,000 characters. Please note members of the Commission may not discuss items that are not specifically identified on the agenda. Therefore, pursuant to A.R.S. 38-431.01(H) action taken as a result of public comment will be limited to directing staff to study the matter, responding to any criticism, or scheduling the matter for further consideration and decision at a later date.

And with that we will move to Agenda Item

No. IV, which is discussion on public comments received

prior to today's May 11th meeting. Before I turn it

over to my colleagues for your thoughts, reactions, you know, anything you want to share, there was one item that, you know, caught my attention, and I would like to share the resolution. There were actually a couple of comments just questioning what the ultimate boundaries were with regard to our law firms that we're using in terms of their ability to be representing, you know, political candidates or other outside interests, and so, you know, it elicited a thoughtful interchanging of our firms, and I would like to give what, you know, has been agreed upon. It really just truly clarifies what they expressed in their interviews and their proposals and, you know, just make sure we're all on the same page.

To anybody listening, we can release the state press, so don't feel that anybody needs to be writing notes. But as a general sense, as promised during the vetting process and required under the applicable rules of professional conduct, IRC's legal counsel will not be advising any candidate, political party, or political committee in regard to the Arizona redistricting process. As the election law bar is small in Arizona, it's understandable that the IRC's legal counsel will continue to advise clients in regard to other unrelated election law matters, including

campaign finance, petition nomination challenges, and initiative compliance issues. As there is no reason to believe that the IRC's legal counsel will not honor their ethical duties to maintain the confidentiality of IRC information, the IRC remains confident in the policies and procedures already mandated by the state bar of Arizona and also in compliance with the Arizona Attorney General's Office contract requirements.

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And with that, I just want to reiterate my experience. I have complete faith in the integrity, the competenceness, the commitment of our attorneys to serve the Commission. They've been working remarkably collegially, collaboratively. I'm most grateful, and it truly has been a bright spot.

And with that I turn it over to other comments or questions.

COMMISSIONER LERNER: Chair Neuberg, I actually have some comments about the public comments that I would like to make.

CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Please.

COMMISSIONER LERNER: So we typically don't spend a lot of time talking about those other than to say thank you and bring up one or two comments, but today I do want to take a few minutes. I actually have a statement that I wrote out to be completely open

here.

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And I want to thank everybody for their comments. We had a lot of comments from the public. Clearly the choice of a mapping consultant was something that was of high interest to the public, and I know I appreciate that. I do want to say, though, that a concern of mine was that there was quite a partisan tone, and there was some misinformation that was included in many of the comments, and I just want to respond to a few of them about that.

Many of you asked us to hire an independent redistricting company without partisan influence, and our chair had commented on that, that we all felt it would have been ideal had we been able to do so, but we only received three proposals, and all of them had partisanship as part of that. Haystack was leaning Democrat; Timmons and NDC and Taylor English lean Republican.

The majority of the comments that I want to discuss are those who opposed hiring Haystack, and they focused on their partisanship, not the qualifications. So I'm compelled to clarify that despite what many people said, they are not a Socialist company, nor are they owned by Obama or Sanders, both of whom were simply clients of Haystack. And I want to clarify

that, that Obama and Sanders would have had nothing to do with Arizona's mapping process, despite what many people commented upon.

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Many people also said that Haystack was the company that was responsible for the redistricting maps in 2011, which is correct. But those who are opposed I feel used some inflammatory terms like "political operatives, " "dangerous, " "un-American, " "corrupt, " "biased," and said the maps were a fiasco that resulted in gerrymandering, none of which is true. Despite many lawsuits that occurred by Republicans to overturn the maps, all of the maps that had been created Haystack received Department of Justice preclearance on the first try and met the requirements of the Voting Rights In fact, looking at the last ten years since those maps were adopted the Republicans maintained control of both chambers of the state legislature for the entire decade, so clearly if this was this a Democrat -- quote, Democrat firm, was as biased as many said, the Democrats would have won more seats and potentially taken control of the House -- the state legislature, which did not happen.

So in my opinion the numbers were assigned that the maps that were created were fair and balanced as they should be and as we would like them to be, so

Haystack was a qualified candidate, created nonpartisan maps in 2011, despite many of the comments about them that were made. The comments, again, focused almost exclusively on them being a Democratic company, not on their qualifications.

So from my perspective -- this is sort of for the future, I'm hoping -- the harshness of many of the comments that were made against Haystack, the negative tones directed at the Commission, were inappropriate.

So I ask you to remember we're volunteers. We are doing our best, and the angry tone you presented does us no good, nor in my opinion does it help your cause. This is my opinion. Last week on a 3 to 2 vote NDC was selected as our mapping consultant, and I will be working with them. I will also be paying close attention to ensure among other things as required by our Constitution minority and Native American representation are properly addressed.

So I do ask that you please continue to send us your comments and provide feedback, but I would appreciate it if it's done in a respectful manner. If you're uncertain about the process, please ask us questions. We'll do our best to answer them. We want to continue to hear from the public. We want to engage with the public, but we would like to do it in a

respectful fashion. Thank you.

Thank you, Madam Chair.

CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Thank you.

Any other thoughts? Thank you to the public. We made a commitment to provide access. I would like to remind the public we are under no legal obligation to open ourselves up to this level of public comment, and we care deeply, but we also understand the limitations. The people who are satisfied and happy are not screaming. They're pretty silent. And so as we do the process as, you know, data scientists, we have to understand the source of the data and, you know, understand our full state as best as possible. And I share Commissioner Lerner's deep dedication to protecting the minority interests, every community of interest in Arizona.

And with that, I hope that our public can focus on the many wonderful things that are going on with this Commission. The overwhelming majority of our votes have been unanimous. We've worked collegially. We have great law firms. We're building a great staff we have checks and balances. I know that political partisanship and tension outside of our world is really, really hot, but it is my deepest, deepest desire for us to return to our honest, respectful

1 dialogue. Our work is just beginning. It's all ahead.

2 And I have confidence that we're going to do right by

the State. Yeah, it's been disappointing.

Any other comments?

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With that we'll move to Item No.

V, executive director's report and discussion thereof.

And with that I will turn it over to Brian.

MR. SCHMITT: Thank you, Chairwoman.

I just have a few updates for you today.

Regarding the office move, we finalized plans, and

hopefully we'll get in a new space either early June or

early July. Still figuring out the timeline. There is

13 a lot of moving pieces down here.

The budget, the legislature is still negotiating so hopefully we'll have resolution in the next week or two, and then we can really start to flesh

out our budget and provide those numbers.

FTE positions, I'm still waiting on an increase in authority. As soon as I have that I will post the two previous positions that were approved, but until that happens we're kind in a holding pattern.

With ADOA and IT, we've been working through the requirement, the system requirements that we think we'll need, and hopeful that that will get online in the next couple of weeks. There is a little bit of

CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: And can you just share, if you don't mind, the duties of this community outreach coordinator? How is this person going to facilitate our work? And to be honest, how is this person potentially going to calm people's concerns about accessing the needs and the views of our minority populations? Can you share a little bit about what we're looking for?

MR. SCHMITT: Absolutely. I think over the next six months it's going to be important that the Commission reach out to as many different groups, communities of interest as possible. It's going to be a job that everyone on the staff has. Having someone that can help coordinate or reach different groups would be a helpful add-on to the Commission.

We had the benefit of getting a full debrief from our counsel on training with conflicts of interests and ethics, the use of subcommittees.
