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1 COMMISSIONER LERNER: Please stand up when you introduce yourself. 2 3 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: They need the mics. COMMISSIONER MEHL: Hello, I'm David Mehl; I'm from 4 5 Pima County. 6 COMMISSIONER LERNER: And now what we're going to 7 do is go to San Carlos, have introductions there. 8 MS. CRANK: Commissioner Lerner and Commissioner 9 Mehl, Chairwoman Neuberg is on her way, she's en route. COMMISSIONER LERNER: Okay. And do we have someone 10 11 from Wickenburg? Is Commissioner Watchman... 12 VICE CHAIR WATCHMAN: Yes, good evening. This is 13 Vice Chairman Derrick Watchman and good evening everybody 14 here in Wickenburg. I represent Apache County from Window 15 Rock, I'm the Democratic appointee to the Commission. So 16 good evening, everybody. 17 COMMISSIONER LERNER: We will now move to Agenda 18 Item II, which is public comments. And staff will read the 19 rules. 20 In compliance with Arizona's open MS. NEUMANN: 21 meeting law, speakers should confine their statements to the 22 issue on the posted agenda which is before the Commission. 23 Speakers are also requested to limit their comments 24 to approximately two minutes. The two minutes will be strictly enforced for all speakers. 25

We'll have our first five speakers line up behind 22 23 We've got Senator Rick Gray, Linda Busam, David Marsh, me. 24 Bonnie Angster. 25 SPEAKER GRAY: Thank you. I am Senator Rick Gray

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from LD-21, which includes Sun City, the -- the community that we're in. For clear disclosure, I'm also a Sun City resident.

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So first I want to thank the Commission for maintaining the community of interest. The original maps had Sun City split in half, which was not good for us at all; that was brought back together so I want to applaud you for that.

9 I do want to say, though, when you're looking at the congressional district, I have deep concerns about our 10 11 community of interest when we look at what's in, and my view 12 is we should move CD-8 farther west because we are now going 13 to be -- the west side in my district and Surprise is going 14 to be actually in a rural CD, which I don't think is 15 appropriate. We're a -- we're a urban community; we also 16 have dynamics when it comes to -- I've got a -- we put 17 together a West Valley caucus because we're looking at the 18 transportation tax and we're -- we're kind of wrestling with 19 the East Valley. There's -- there's strong communities of 20 interest over here and when we actually lose part of that 21 because we're in a different congressional district, it 22 undermines us.

23 So I think that having CD-8 extended to include 24 Surprise, that keeps us more as a CD that is an urban CD 25 rather than just a small part and that's my concern is we --

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if we're a small part and we've got all this rural area, we can actually use -- lose our voice and what should be a priority for us then becomes a -- a lack of -- of focus.

And so my -- again, I want to -- I want to thank you for focusing on the constitutional requirements highlighted by communities of interest and I would urge you to look at that in light of the current CDs, too, and reproportion CD-8 to go farther west and include Surprise.

Thank you.

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SPEAKER BUSAM: Hello, my name is Linda Busam and I'm a resident of Peoria in ZIP Code 85345 and currently redistricted into LD-27.

Peoria, Sun City, Surprise, El Mirage are my communities of interest. It's where my family lives, it's where I shop, receive medical care, socialize and go to church. I choose to live here because I love my diverse community, what -- what it has to offer; and I'm particularly interested in our K through 12 school system, which are essential to the future of our children.

20 West-MEC offers Dysart and Peoria High School 21 students a last -- a fast track forward to career in 22 technical education courses that unifies our schools.

The mayors and the city council members of these towns work together to achieve desired goals and solutions and we share the same problems and interests.

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The suburban West Valley has no connection with the urban city of Phoenix and -- or rural La Paz or Mohave Counties. Nor does Maricopa County share anything in common with Arizona's surrounding counties and these boundaries should never be intermingled.

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Please draw CD-8 to include Peoria, El Mirage, Surprise and all of the Sun Cities, as they share Peoria and Dysart School Districts.

Please move the urban Central Phoenix into CD-3 where they're -- where they share commonality and can be fairly represented.

LD-27 should include Sun City because parts of it are also in the Peoria School District. Currently Peoria and Surprise are broken up into different districts, where they should remain intact.

Following the Arizona Constitution should be the Commission's only focus instead of seeking party competitiveness like they did ten years ago. It was not fair to the people of Arizona, nor were we fairly represented.

The Arizona Constitution Article IV Part 2 Section 1 states that: One, Arizona must comply with the federal --0kay.

> Well, thank you very much. Thank you. COMMISSIONER MEHL: Thank you.

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SPEAKER MARSH: My name is David Marsh. My wife and I are Christian and retired. We lived in LD-15 and CD-8 prior to moving to our current 55-plus community in north Surprise. We both volunteer at Luke Air Force Base. There are supposed to be 1,500 homes in our 55-plus community in seven years. Our linear precinct at the western edge of the district with a lot of emphasis on the eastern part of the LD.

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9 We've experienced what it's like to have different 10 common interests and priorities. According to the current 11 LD-28 precinct map, we regrouped with people from the rural, 12 western and northern parts of Maricopa County. The needs 13 and wants in common with these sections of the LD would be 14 different. We have more in common and shop with those in 15 LD-29 which includes most of the city of Surprise.

16 The other thing is that the LD meeting may be far 17 from us. We'd be assigned to Congressional District 9, 18 which is about seven miles west of District 8. We would 19 again experience being at the edge of a very mixed district. 20 The commonalties of us living in suburban Surprise and 21 concurrently -- or currently in CD-8 are different than 22 those in the Gladden and surrounding rural areas of Maricopa 23 County. Similar interests in shopping are done with those 24 in CD-8. In both cases we are suburban versus rural 25 dwellers, would like to see the suburban West Valley kept in

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one congressional district as we have more cohesive interests than differences.

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SPEAKER ANGSTER: Good evening and thank you for the opportunity.

My name is Bonnie Angster, a resident of Sun City for 27 years. There seems to be a serious concern for the boundaries that are proposed for LD-29. It appears that we would be better off if we moved to 27 -- LD-27, which would include Sun City.

Focusing on communities, Sun Cityians have a tendency and prone to do their business in Peoria and the Arrowhead area. This includes shopping; entertainment; sporting events; restaurants; and importantly, medical facilities.

Rather than placing Sun City as far as -- west as proposed, it would fit the common interest of the district needs. These are the boundaries that I propose: 67 Avenue for the east boundary including a majority of Peoria, then using Northern Avenue for the southern boundary, Dysart Road for the western border and Lake Pleasant Parkway for the northern border.

Keeping Sun City and the surrounding areas, suburbs in a compact district.

Now, concerning CD-8, to be more practical, the

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district needs to include Peoria, Sun City, Youngtown, El Mirage, Surprise, Sun City West and the possibility of all the way to Sun City Festival. Not dividing the Sun Cities, uniting the West Valley, including the many retirement communities herein.

As the IRC is focused on common interests of unified communities, these are my recommendations.

I thank you for this opportunity.

(Applause.)

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MS. NEUMANN: Our next speakers are Mitch Friedlander, Howard Klemmer, Lynn Peters, Roy Jenks, Margaret Popp, and Sheila Roberts.

SPEAKER FRIEDLANDER: Hi, my name is Mitch
Friedlander, I live in Sun City Grand which is part of
Surprise. Previously I've submitted written testimony on my
objection to previous maps and I'm still going to talk about
the same changes or lack of changes that you've made.

18 I moved to Arizona in 2010 when -- and I retired in 19 2015. We moved to a 55-plus community, and when you split 20 Sun City and you split the other adult communities and took them away from our district, it made it seem it was -- it 21 was impossible to be cohesive, to be a unit, for similar 22 23 interests and groups. We are retired, we are all -- most of 24 us on fixed incomes and we in Surprise and in Grand, there 25 are approximately 9,700 homes and there are about 20,000

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residents.

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2	When you move us into CD-9, we don't have that kind		
3	of population, it's totally rural or farming and we have no		
4	common interests with anything from Mojave, La Paz, Yuma		
5	except for Maricopa County. And, again, if you would move		
6	CD-8 slightly to the west where we used to be and take us		
7	out of CD-9, it would be more appropriate for everybody		
8	living within that community.		
9	Thank you.		
10	(Applause.)		
11	SPEAKER KLEMMER: Hi, my name is Howard Klemmer.		
12	I live in Surprise, actually in Sun City Grand.		
13	I've lived there for 16 years. Everybody has said what I		
14	would like to say, so I feel cheated but thank you anyway.		
15	And thank for letting me have an opportunity to say		
16	something.		
17	I do believe in the CDs, that's 29 and 27, probably		
18	would be better amalgamated, share our common sense of		
19	interest; and in CD, I agree with my previous speaker Mitch		
20	that moving Surprise and other surrounding communities back		
21	into CD-8 would be a benefit to the people of Surprise.		
22	Thank you.		
23	(Applause.)		
24	COMMISSIONER LERNER: We want to we want to		
25	acknowledge that many of you might have similar things to		

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say; we don't want to discourage you from speaking on your own, but if you do, you can do just what we just heard, which is acknowledge that you agree with previous speakers on those points instead of -- I know you may have a long speech, I'm not saying not to do the speech, but if you choose you can also just tell us that you agree with those previous comments and we will record that.

SPEAKER JENKS: Good evening. Thank you for letting me speak.

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I have a raspy voice so I hope that you can understand what I'm saying.

My name is Lieutenant Colonel Roy Jenks, U.S. Army retired. I live in Sun City West and we've lived there since 2000. I'm a 25-year military veteran who chose to retire in Arizona in Sun City West.

I've been a member of the American Legion Reserve Officers -- Reserve Officers Association since my retirement in 1958. So I figure this is probably the only time I'm going to get a chance to address a Commission like this 'cause that will make me a little too old I think to make it to the next one.

We decided to retire in Sun City West because of the close proximity -- one of the reasons -- to Luke Air Base. We have access to Base pharmacy, medical services; and some people don't realize, but Arizona is a top location

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for military retirement in the entire community -- country. 1 2 In fact, there are five Arizona military retirement 3 locations in the top hundred cities in the country -- and this is kind of news to me also -- Scottsdale, Arizona, is 4 5 ranked third in the nation as far as preferability. 6 Military veterans like the area around Luke for 7 employment, both active duty and military, retired military. 8 The current legislative boundaries have really proven very 9 worthwhile for the military. And the military families and friends have been 10 11 very -- appreciative. 12 That's time. MS. NEUMANN: 13 SPEAKER JENKS: Okay. It would -- I'd be willing 14 to traverse any boundaries, in my opinion, and military 15 serve -- retirees have served their country for many years 16 and would like to feel their selection of Arizona and the 17 retirement home carefully. 18 Okay. I would just like to thank you and God bless 19 your work and your decisions that you're going to make. 20 COMMISSIONER LERNER: Thank you. 21 COMMISSIONER MEHL: Thank you. 22 (Applause.) 23 SPEAKER POPP: Hello and thank you, my name is 24 Margaret Popp. And I live in Sun City West and that is a 25 55-plus community, and we are surrounded with veterans and a

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lot of retired folks, so the draw for Luke Air Force Base to the south and all through the areas in between, all the adult communities, they should really try to keep them all together and in CD-8 and it's just a matter of like interests.

I changed up my speech here a little bit, but just having the opportunity to be able to -- that's why all the retirees, the snowbirds and everybody moved down here, because of the atmosphere of the West Valley corridor.

So anyway, I do thank you very much and I look forward to 2022.

(Applause.)

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SPEAKER PETERS: Commissioners, thank you for the opportunity to share my concerns about draft map CD-9; and yes, I agree with most of the previous comments about CD-9 but I'd like to share mine.

My name is Lynn Peters and I have lived in the city of Surprise for 21 years. During that time I have never had an Arizona state legislator, representative or federal congressman that shared my values. Never.

21 My biggest concern with draft map CD-9 is that it 22 does not meet several of the constitutional requirements. 23 CD-9 is far from compact; the Maricopa County portion of 24 CD-9 shoots off from a mostly rectangular shape simply 25 because the western edge of Arizona does not meet the

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population requirements of a congressional district.

Adding Maricopa communities to CD-9 simply to meet population requirements for communities of other counties violates the intent of communities of interest criteria of Proposition 106.

CD-9 is solidly uncompetitive; CD-9 includes four diverse counties: Mohave, La Paz, Maricopa and Yuma. I didn't even know there was a La Paz County.

CD-9 is geographically mostly rural; while communities of Surprise, Sun City West, El Mirage and Litchfield Park are urban and densely populated.

Our issues and interests are dramatically different from rural cities and towns. We do not relate to Lake Havasu City, Kingman, Bullhead City, Lake Mead or Quartzsite or the Colorado River Indian Reservation all grouped with Maricopa County, Metro Phoenix communities.

When CD-2 cuts into CD-9 in the north, it is for a Native American community of interest. When CD-2 cuts into Pinal County, I agree it is for another Native American community of interest; however, when CD-9 cuts into Maricopa County, there is no community of interest, so it -- it's really very illogical.

You spend a great deal of time focusing on southern
Arizona and the Tucson area, I hope that you will take the
same consideration for the northwest Metro Phoenix

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1 communities. 2 Commissioners, thank you for your time. 3 (Applause.) SPEAKER ROBERTS: Hi, my name is Sheila Roberts. 4 Ι live in Glendale, 85308. Since this is my first time 5 testifying, I simply just wanted to voice my opinion on how 6 7 common interests and cohesiveness of my community seems to 8 be more authentic, inclusive, and has a positive outcome 9 versus being competitive, which seems to me to be divisive and kind of self-serving. 10 11 So thank you. 12 (Applause.) 13 MS. NEUMANN: Thank you. We'll now go to 14 Wickenburg with Marie and Vice Chair Watchman. 15 16 MS. CAMACHO: Thank you. Good evening from 17 Wickenburg. 18 Before we start, I'd like to introduce our Spanish 19 interpreter, who is available to anybody who may need 20 assistance. 21 Please come up, Brenda. THE INTERPRETER: Good evening, everyone. My name 22 23 is Brenda Lopez. If you need a Spanish interpreter, I am 24 present here. 25 (Spanish language.)

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MS. CAMACHO: We have four speakers in Wickenburg and just to remind the speakers since the video was interrupted, you have two minutes to speak and I have a timer.

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Our first speaker will be Yavapai County Supervisor Harry Oberg, the second speaker will be Nohl Rosen, the third speaker will be Joanne Pierce, and then final speaker will be Kate McKusker.

9 SPEAKER OBERG: Good evening, Madam Chair and 10 Commissioners. My name is Harry Oberg and I'm a Yavapai 11 County Supervisor.

I would like to provide comments in support of map CD0068 which revises your draft CD map. Map 68 is superior in that it seeks to establish rural congressional districts that are very aligned, are various communities of interest.

16 Your CD map combines Yavapai County with the 17 eastern counties of Navajo and Apache and portions of the Pinal and Graham Counties.

Yavapai County has long-standing communities of 19 20 interest related to our western culture and heritage of 21 ranching, mining, agriculture and forestry, coupled with our 22 rural lifestyle and fierce protection of our scarce water 23 resources. Combining Yavapai County with Apache and Navajo 24 County would result in diminishing our communities of 25 interest.

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Yavapai County has few common interests with the eastern and southern communities. They don't have the same water issues that we do in the high desert areas of north central and western Arizona. The tribal areas of the east and south have superior water rights in Arizona.

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Our communities of interest lie more naturally with the rural counties of Coconino, Gila, Mohave and La Paz, which have similar scarce water resources. Map 68 provides that these counties be combined with Yavapai in the one CD and the entire town of the town of Wickenburg aligned with CD-2 and LD-5.

12 But map 68 does not fix one area just to break 13 another, rather this map also proposes that the eastern and 14 southern counties have common communities of interest that 15 align better with one another and should comprise their own 16 Combining these eastern counties naturally establishes CD. 17 a minority-majority district which would provide 18 congressional representation specifically attuned to unique 19 Native American interests.

Needless to say, we see water is primary in redistricting consideration since it is a common and urgent community of interest in much of Arizona. We hope that you will take water into consideration in drafting your final maps.

Thank you.

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SPEAKER ROSEN: Hello, my name is Nohl Rosen. I am here in the town of Wickenburg, I live here in the town of Wickenburg, and I've testified before the Commission several times that Wickenburg as a whole town needs to be in LD-5 and CD-2. We don't have anything in common with -- with any of the areas that are in LD-28 and the CD-9 maps.

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We're a western town, so we've got a lot in common with our neighbors to the north. Now, what people don't know about Wickenburg is that they're around the area of Wickenburg Ranch that was annexed into the town of Wickenburg. This is the reason why we need to all stay together as one whole town. I realize that we are -- that we are split by two counties, but the Maricopa County side of Wickenburg wants to be in LD-5 and CD-2, which is where we feel we're going to have the best representation.

We have a lot in common with Congress, we have a lot in common with the areas like North Ranch and in -- and other areas in -- in Yavapai County. We've got roping, we've got rodeo, we've got the western look and the western lifestyle, we also have a little bit of mining as well. This is why it's so important, as I've stated several times, that we need to be in LD-5 and CD-2.

I'm hoping that the Commission will -- more or less will have the stamp on that, because you focused on other areas and you've completely left out Wickenburg in the mix

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of -- of areas of key interest.

2 It's like I said, we don't have anything in common 3 with -- with the LD-28 and CD-9 maps. We're not properly represented there. So I hope that the Commission will take 4 5 my testimony under consideration; and like I said, as I've said many times, put us in LD-5 and CD-2. 6 7 Thank you. 8 VICE CHAIR WATCHMAN: Thank you. 9 SPEAKER PIERCE: Good evening, hi. I'm Joanne Pierce and I reside here at Wickenburg Ranch. 10 I've 11 testified twice before, once in Congress and in Scottsdale. As before, I urge you to keep Wickenburg Ranch in 12 13 LD-5 as before. I also urge you to unify Wickenburg Town 14 into Wickenburg Ranch and keep us both in LD-5, Yavapai. We 15 are clearly small town, no big box, no big population; we 16 are western in flavor, enjoying all things rodeo and 17 ranching; we're nothing in common with Phoenix proper, 18 Maricopa County. We live, work, play, shop locally and 19 medical here as well. 20 We actively participate in all things cowboy, just 21 as Prescott and surrounding towns. We are town people not big city folks. For the 22 23 third time, I'm urging you to hear me and unify 24 Wickenburg Ranch and the town of Wickenburg into LD-5 and 25 CD-2.

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Thank you.

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VICE CHAIR WATCHMAN: Thank you.

SPEAKER McKUSKER: Thank you. I'm Kate McKusker. And to be honest with you, I'm not exactly sure how these maps work.

You want me to repeat?

I'm Kate McKusker and I'll be honest, I'm not really sure exactly where these lines are drawn on the map. I'm confused by looking at these four pieces of paper, however I want to say this.

I've lived here for 21 years, have visited the community since 1992 prior to living here. And I have to disagree with the Wickenburg Ranch resident who just spoke.

Wickenburg is an ex-urban community, we are 30 to 35 miles from Surprise. Yes, we have become a roping capital; yes, we are a western town; but we have nothing in common with the far west part of Arizona.

18 So although I don't understand the maps completely, 19 what I do understand is that the way the lines are currently 20 drawn where we are a represented by a congressman out of 21 Kingman really does not relate to us at all. We relate yes to Wickenburg Ranch, a little bit to Prescott, a lot to the 22 23 West Valley, and I think it's very important for you to 24 consider, no matter what these maps say, we don't really fit 25 with the far western part of the state at all.

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And this has been a common feeling among residents, 1 people I've known, people I work with. I've worked for the 2 3 town of Wickenburg for the last 20 years. So it would be great if you could do something 4 5 about it. 6 Thank you very much. 7 VICE CHAIR WATCHMAN: Thank you. 8 MS. CAMACHO: Thank you. That concludes the 9 speakers from Wickenburg. We will now go to Michele in San Carlos. 10 11 MS. CRANK: Give an opportunity to our Chairwoman 12 to introduce herself. 13 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Hello, everyone. It's 14 wonderful to be here. I am Chairwoman Neuberg. I live in 15 Chandler, and thank you everybody for participating; and 16 thank you, colleagues, for joining us this evening as well. 17 MS. CRANK: Thank you, Madam Chair. And then I'd 18 also like our Apache translator to come up and introduce 19 himself. 20 THE INTERPRETER: Good evening, ladies and 21 gentlemen. My name is Bartholomew Sisto, I'm an interpreter for Apache. Thank you. Good evening. 22 23 (Apache language spoken.) 24 MS. CRANK: Madam Chair, members of the Commission 25 and the listening audience, we have four speakers here in

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San Carlos; and just to remind the speakers, you do have two minutes and I will be timing.

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The first speaker is Mr. Steve Titla, next speaker is Kodee Goseyun, and then Bernadette Kniffin, and Anthony Bejarano.

> SPEAKER TITLA: Good evening, Chairwoman and staff. (Apache language spoken.)

Good evening, we're here -- I'm sorry, you have to repeat.

THE INTERPRETER: Good evening, ladies and gentlemen. He says it's good to be here and it's good for you guys to come and visit our reservation once in a while.

SPEAKER TITLA: I have a letter from the chairman, he couldn't be here and I know two minutes is ticking along so I'm going to try to read it fast.

Chairman Rambler planned on being here but he was -- had to go to Phoenix on emergency, so this is San Carlos Apache Tribe which I'll give to you after I read it. He says: Honorable Dr. Erika Neuberg, the Honorable Derrick Watchman, Honorable David Mehl, the Honorable Dr. Shereen Lerner, the Honorable Douglas York, Arizona Independent Redistricting Commission.

Dear Chairman Neuberg, Vice Chairman Watchman and Commissioners, on behalf of the 17,000 members of the San Carlos Apache tribe, thank you for the opportunity to

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host this important event and to provide comments on -about the draft redistricting maps.

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In response, please accept this letter as the Tribe's public comment as it pertains to the community of interest that makes up the currently proposed Legislative District 6 and Congressional District 2 as set forth in legislative test map version 10.0 and congressional test map version 7.1 respectfully.

Briefly, the Tribe believes that any proposed -any proposal to revise district boundaries from the prior redistricting cycle by fractionating the existing communities of interest shared among the seven tribes and their homelands will have an adverse impact by diluting their current voting strength.

Moreover -- moreover, revising district boundaries could splinter and dilute the community of interest shared among tribes and tribal members who live off reservations in nearby cities and towns. Therefore, it is absolutely imperative that the Commission maintains a robust Native American majority-minority legislative district capable of electing its preferred candidate into office.

22 Recall that the San Carlos Apache tribes 23 reservations were communities of interest, the San Carlos 24 Apache tribe is a community of interest with the White 25 Mountain Apache tribe and the Navajo Nation and other rural

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tribes in northeastern and northwestern Arizona. We share a common language with White Mountain Apaches and similar language to the Navajos.

Navajos and Apaches live in nearby border towns such as the towns along Interstate 40, Show Low, Pinetop and Springerville, so they should not be excluded from the proposed Legislative District 6. Moreover, we continue to have concerns about the inclusion of Flagstaff in the proposed Legislative District 6 as discussed below.

We're okay? Okay.

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Under the Voting Rights Act, our tribal members are entitled to a district that gives us the opportunity to elect candidates of our choice. If the Commission were to include Flagstaff in Legislative District 6, it could prevent us from electing candidates of choice into the legislation -- into legislature.

In 2004 Native American voters were unable to elect their candidate of choice in the only Native American 19 majority-minority district in the state because Flagstaff voters mobilized to defeat the Native American majority-minority district.

When the district was redrawn in 2010, LD-7, the 22 23 Native American majority-minority district, excluded 24 Flagstaff. Flagstaff has grown over 18 percent since the 25 last census, a much higher rate than any of the

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off-reservation border towns in northern Arizona. This means that Native Americans will likely lose the majority during the decade and further be impacted from electing candidates of choice if the Commission adopts a final legislative map that includes the city of Flagstaff.

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Further, Native Americans are the most underpopulated race in the census. Arizona is ranked number one in the U.S. with the highest number of American Indians and Alaska Natives living in hard-to-count census tracts with 68.1 percent of the state's Native population living in hard-to-count areas. Poverty, lack of broadband service, housing insecurity, language barriers and the COVID-19 pandemic further increases the risk of the 2020 census undercounting Arizona's Native American population.

15 The Voting Rights Act instructs the Independent 16 Redistricting Commission to use its lawful discretion to 17 protect the interests of the only Native American majority-minority legislative district in Arizona. The 19 Commission should deviate greater from the target population 20 due to this undercount in order to create a strong Native 21 American majority-minority district.

22 Finally, the U.S. Supreme Court has affirmed that 23 total population deviations of 10 percent or less are 24 presumptively constitutional, and population deviations 25 greater than 10 percent may be justified by legitimate state

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interests such as preserving a strong Native American majority-minority legislative district. The exclusion of the city of Flagstaff would achieve this legitimate state interest.

As we say in our Apache language (Apache language spoken) for the opportunity to provide comments for this public hearing and allowing the tribe to host this important meeting.

Thank you.

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I am Steve Titla, by the way, for the record. San Carlos Apache member.

SPEAKER GOSEYUN: Hello, thank you for the opportunity to voice my concerns regarding Congressional District 2 and Legislative District 6.

My name is Kodee Goseyun, proud San Carlos Apache Tribal member. I would like to agree with Steve Titla and agree with his previous comments.

I would also like to add any change made to the Congressional District 2 maps lowers and dilutes the voting strength for Native American communities. We need a strong Native American majority-minority district for congressional and legislative voting purposes. Please take this into consideration.

Thank you.

SPEAKER KNIFFIN: Good evening. My name is

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Bernadette Kniffin from San Carlos, Arizona. I'm a tribal member, born and raised here. I agree with Steve Titla as well and also Kodee Goseyun with our tribe on honoring the District 6 map.

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It would put us with our Native American brothers and sisters; we have like interests, like goals. I believe that would really give us an advantage in the future. So likewise, on behalf of 17,000 tribal members, I agree with the District 6 map.

Thank you. Have a good day.

SPEAKER BEJARANO: Hello. My name is Anthony Bejarano, I'm from Safford.

13 I spoke at the previous Safford meeting, this is 14 the closest one, so I -- I'm just here to just give concerns 15 about what I believe my proposed congressional and 16 legislative districts are, which would be 6 and 19 respectively. Especially because -- well, I will just use 17 18 the little arm that's -- looks like it's coming from, like, 19 Congressional District 6 that looks like pretty much a -- a 20 travel plan to Phoenix through Tucson which is a -- I'll just say that's -- specifically that's a trip I've never 21 gone on before, as opposed to here, San Carlos, my family --22 23 well, I've only been on that trip once in my 25 years. 24 My family comes through Bylas and San Carlos,

Globe, all the way to Phoenix multiple times a year; and, in

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fact, we -- my family made this trip a chance to go visit
the casino.

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So this is -- so I believe that -- and I live in Thatcher and Safford, so I believe that's an example of the stronger community ties that -- where I live and this area and in the areas surrounding here versus Sierra Vista versus the many very -- I don't want to say "very" because it's a -- everyone lives in a lovely place, but that route down there and all the way down to the border which I've only been once on school trips where they show us places that we don't normally see. We don't normally see this border, which is why I don't believe it's that strong a community of interest.

The same things apply almost to the legislative district stretching into Santa Cruz County; again, I've only been there on school trips and -- yeah.

I didn't really have prepared remarks but thank you so much.

MS. CRANK: That concludes our speakers for San Carlos. I'll send it back over to Sun City.

MS. NEUMANN: Thank you, Michele.

Our next five speakers are Clair Van Steenwyk - sorry about that. Thomas Kieffer, Richard Newcomer, Frank
 Rizzo and Timothy Schwartz.

Sorry.

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SPEAKER VAN STEENWYK: Oh, that's all right. They've been doing it to me for years ever since I was a child.

It's gotten worse.

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Anyway, good evening. My name's Clair Van Steenwyk.

First of all, I want to thank the Commission for listening to the people from the Surprise meeting when we came and pleaded with you to unify Sun City once again.

Secondly, the statement about following the U.S. Constitution and the Voters Rights Acts, I don't know how many people are aware of it but many parts of all the Voters Rights Act have been challenged in the Supreme Court and many parts of them have been ruled unconstitutional, so I'd really like a definition on what parts you do follow so I can understand how it works.

17 LD-25 will not serve the West Valley at all. CD-8 18 properly right now goes all over this and that's another 19 part of this whole discussion. CD-8 from 67, say north of 20 -- to the north of where it is now, as long as it's west to the 17 would be nice; and all the way down to the 10, not 21 past it, as the representative we presently have has gone to 22 23 a good deal of trouble to set up a West Valley office so 24 that the seniors and the veterans and others can go visit it 25 very easily.

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1 I live in Sun City Festival. After the last 2 departure from reality and I never saw the representative 3 from Kingman and I know Paul and had invited him out there to speak at different meetings, they never had the time to 4 5 come there and I can understand why when you look at a road 6 map. 7 Professionally I used to handle logistics and 8 demographics for food companies in California and across the 9 country and this one makes no sense at all; if you were a 10 UPS driver, you would probably quit. 11 Secondly, I'd like to see LD-29 stay the way it is 12 right now with the exception of possibly getting back the --13 the districts just -- I quess northeast off Grand Avenue at 14 163rd. 15 That's time. MS. NEUMANN: 16 SPEAKER VAN STEENWYK: Oh boy. That's time up 17 already. 18 MS. NEUMANN: It is. SPEAKER VAN STEENWYK: Anyway, that's what I hope 19 20 I'd like to see CD-8 retained a little more of what vou do. it has. Don't go below the 10, don't go beyond where it is 21 east or west, but please don't put us out in the desert. 22 23 It's hot enough. 24 (Applause.) 25 SPEAKER KIEFFER: Good evening, everybody. My name

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is Thomas Kieffer. I live in LD-30 and I've lived there since 1967.

Anyways, I was just hoping that maybe when you do redistricting that you'll form the boundaries in a little more rational way 'cause right now the boundaries go from 19th Avenue over to 27th Avenue and so when you're walking a precinct, walking down the streets, you get to the freeway and then you have to walk all the way down to Bethany and around for a little strip on the other side of the freeway, from the freeway to 27th Avenue just to -- it's not hardly worth doing. But anyways it would make more sense for that strip to be part of the larger district to the west of the freeway.

So anyways, I don't know why they split that off just to get with the LD on the other side of the freeway, it doesn't make sense. But anyways it would be much more practical to do it that way.

Thank you.

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19 COMMISSIONER MEHL: Can you say again what 20 district? 21 SPEAKER KIEFFER: LD-30. 22 COMMISSIONER MEHL: 30. 23 COMMISSIONER LERNER: That's the old district, 24 right? 25 SPEAKER KIEFFER: Okay, I currently live on -- near

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27th Avenue and Bethany. If you look at the district, there's boundaries on 27th Avenue, so between 27th Avenue and the freeway there's just a little strip. There's mostly like a Food City, there's apartments, Saints Simon and Judge Cathedral. So it's just like a small strip, it doesn't make sense to --

COMMISSIONER MEHL: Thank you.

8 SPEAKER KIEFFER: -- attach it to the other side of 9 the freeway.

Thank you.

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SPEAKER NEWCOMER: Hi, I'm Richard Newcomer. I live in Goodyear. I live in the area called Estrella Mountain Ranch.

We're part of Goodyear, our interests are with the city of Goodyear, but our LD-4 is spread out between Yuma and -- and Tucson, which it doesn't make any sense at all. We're like the little finger area up between parts of Goodyear and -- and Buckeye on our west and whatnot.

But it -- it really needs to draw the lines so that our interests are protected. And don't pull us out and put us in with remote areas that have no connection to us other than the fact that they live in Arizona like we do, you know. I mean, it just -- it's absolutely ridiculous. And even then our -- our congressional district that you did that so poorly that they have a -- one party has a

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1 stronghold and we got nothing.

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And -- and then the other way in Yuma, they joined with Tucson somehow and I don't know how they do that, but we're two hours away from Yuma and we're another two hours away from Tucson. And that's driving pretty good, too, like 75, 80 miles an hour. I mean, come on, it just doesn't -it doesn't make practical sense.

Thank you for the time to speak.

(Applause.)

SPEAKER SCHWARTZ: Good evening. I live inside the area currently known as LD-30 which will become LD-26. Thank you for all the work that's been done on the maps. I see a vast improvement.

There is, however, one area that I believe still needs attention. Several of the precincts in LD-30 are split in half by the I-17 freeway. That's always been a sore spot and that's not been corrected with the new maps.

18 The Black Canyon freeway is a natural boundary. 19 Our new legislative district should be west of the freeway, 20 and the little small strip that's on the east side of the 21 freeway should be included in the other district that's east of the freeway. Once again, the freeway is a natural 22 23 boundary and truly divides. I believe communities of 24 interest have been affected by this boundary and should not be forced -- those people should not be forced to ask why 25

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1 they are separated from the larger group which is on the 2 west side of the boundary. 3 Finally, CD-3 needs to include Glendale and the areas of Alhambra and Encanto. These are Central Phoenix 4 5 neighborhoods and they belong in the Central Phoenix 6 district, they do not belong with north Phoenix or 7 Scottsdale. 8 Thank you for addressing these two very important 9 issues. 10 (Applause.) 11 MS. NEUMANN: Frank Rizzo. 12 SPEAKER RIZZO: Yeah, that's me. 13 MS NEUMANN: Oh, I'm sorry, that was Timothy 14 Schwartz. 15 SPEAKER RIZZO: Right. 16 Good evening. My name is Frank Rizzo and I live currently in LD-22 which will be LD-29 and Congressional 17 18 District 8 which will be Congressional District 9, and I'm 19 really disappointed. 20 I've lived in Arizona three times in my long life 21 and I've lived here in areas of interest at my time of life. Since 1995 I've lived here these last 25 years in four 22 23 locations: I was in Ahwatukee with children, in Carefree 24 as -- as a middle class executive, up in Anthem nearing my senior years, and then moved to Surprise in 2014 to retire. 25

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And by doing this now, we're splitting us apart.

2 The Sun Cities need to be at least cohesive and 3 there's many veterans in Sun City Grand, Sun City West and Sun City who have a lot in common with the Luke Air Force 4 5 Base. So we've -- we're being torn apart there and then we've stuck Festival out to the left and they're -- they're 6 7 part of Buckeye, but their common interest is also included 8 in Sun City Grand and Surprise. They have to come into town 9 to shop and to -- to worship, to eat because there's not much as far as amenities out there. But now they're forced 10 11 to be going down to Buckeye; in fact, that's where their 12 hospitalization is. 13 My medical needs with chronic diseases that I have 14 are tied to Sun City West with the -- with the medical 15 facilities here, so I believe that we need to stay intact 16 with the Sun Cities and with the south of Surprise with the 17 communities -- surrounding communities, and CD-8 needs to be 18 pushed out to the east -- to the west. 19 Thank you. 20 COMMISSIONER MEHL: Thank you. 21 (Applause.) 22 MS. NEUMANN: Folks, when you come up to the 23 podium, please make sure you state your name for the 24 transcriptionist. Thank you. 25 Our next five speakers are Doris Hinton, Robert

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Thomas, Louise Huber, Cheri Tomlinson and Linda McNamara.

SPEAKER HINTON: My name is Doris Hinton and I'm a retired active adult who recently moved to the rapidly growing southwest corner of Surprise in proposed LD-29. We moved from nearby Vistancia to be much closer to where we play at the Surprise pickle ball courts, rec facilities and the White Tank Mountain Park. It is also much closer to shopping, restaurants and the Sun City West medical facilities that we frequent.

As you know, this area is a robust mixture of 10 11 retired seniors, snowbirds and young families who all seem 12 to thrive together along the Bell Road corridor. I believe 13 that we all moved here because of the suburban way of life 14 plus the proximity to Phoenix and Scottsdale culture as well 15 as nearby recreation and an outdoor lifestyle. We did not 16 move here because of the way that our neighbors might vote, 17 and so moving district lines to change the outcome of 18 legislative voting districts in the name of competitiveness 19 would create false barriers in what would otherwise be a 20 natural order.

I do echo the comments that so many have made prior to me about the congressional districts. Surprise is one of the biggest and fastest growing areas of the entire state, and to put it into Congressional District 9 which is largely rural would be a mistake for our area of interest and our

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1 representation.

2 It would be much more appropriate if the current 3 Congressional District 8 boundaries, which incorporates Surprise, Sun City Festival, out west on Bell Road and the 4 newer communities down towards the Air Force base are 5 incorporated still in District 8. 6 7 Thank you very much. 8 (Applause.) 9 SPEAKER THOMAS: My name is Robert Thomas. I'm a precinct committeeman in LD-30, and in the interest of 10 11 brevity I would like to just say I agree with the previous 12 members from LD-30, that I-17 absolutely should be a 13 boundary and not split. It's -- that's basically all I need to say. 14 Thank 15 you. COMMISSIONER LERNER: The current -- the new LD-29, 16 17 correct? 18 SPEAKER THOMAS: Exactly. 19 COMMISSIONER LERNER: Okay. Just checking. 20 (Applause.) SPEAKER HUBER: Good evening. My name is Louise 21 I'm from LD-30 as well and just would like to echo 22 Huber. 23 the comments of Mr. Schwartz and Mr. Thomas that those 24 precincts should not be split up, it's very awkward. 25 Also that the north Central Phoenix area be

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included with south Glendale because they have very common interests.

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3 Thank you. 4 (Applause.) SPEAKER McNAMARA: Hello, my name is Linda McNamara 5 6 and I am from Sun City and I agree with speaker Lynn Peters. 7 COMMISSIONER LERNER: Can you -- I'm sorry, ma'am. 8 Can you just at least give, like, one sentence or two 9 sentences so -- we've heard a lot of speakers and I don't 10 know Lynn Peters, so just one or two sentences to remind us. 11 SPEAKER McNAMARA: Put Maricopa County 12 Metro Phoenix with other Maricopa counties, don't put us 13 with those rural cities. 14 COMMISSIONER LERNER: Got it. 15 COMMISSIONER MEHL: Thank you. 16 SPEAKER McNAMARA: Tucson is in everybody. 17 SPEAKER TOMLINSON: Good evening, my name is Cheri 18 Tomlinson, I reside in the city of Peoria and I currently 19 reside in Legislative District 22. With the proposed maps, 20 I would be moving to Legislative District 28. 21 Thank you for the opportunity to provide public comment tonight. I want to thank the Commissioners for 22 23 sharing the Princeton gerrymandering project report for 24 Arizona. My five comments and recommendations will be 25 addressing how we can improve Arizona's grade C in

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geographic features and competitiveness.

Please consider making the following changes: One, move Wickenburg out of District 28 because the travel corridor for business is more aligned with Highway 60 than Highway 74.

Two, keep Westbrook Village, the retirement community, in one district. I urge the Commissioner to place Westbrook and Rimrock precincts and census tracts in one district.

Three, combine the city of El Mirage, Youngtown and Surprise in one district.

12 My concerns regarding competitiveness are as 13 follows: Currently LD-22 is not competitive at 26 percent 14 voter spread which is based on the 2020 election data. Τf 15 the current draft maps are adopted as-is, LD-28 would be at 16 30.1 percent voter spread, even less competitive than the current voter spread. In addition, LD-27 and 29 would be at 17 18 13.1 percent and 17.3 percent respectively. Obviously not 19 competitive.

The last point is as for the new congressional districts, four of the nine CDs are competitive, with two leaning Democrat and two leaning Republican. Five of the nine congressional districts are not competitive, with three congressional districts favoring Republicans and two favoring Democrats.

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Based on my understanding of the draft maps, the majority of the districts are not competitive, effectively guaranteeing victories to members of only one party in many districts. I wold urge the Commission to continue to work on improving Arizona's competitiveness and align geographic features to ensure fair maps.

Thank you.

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(Applause.)

MS. NEUMANN: Our next five speakers are Carol Ayotte, James Miller, Eric Morgan, Heather Morgan and Susan Black.

SPEAKER AYOTTE: Good evening, my name is Carol Ayotte, and I've been a resident of Maricopa County for the last 34 years and I want districts which represent communities of interest so they may be effectively represented by our elected officials.

Many of us at this meeting are retired and use the 17 18 services such as medical, worship, entertainment, shopping 19 in a 10-to-15-mile radius of our community. 20 Arrowhead Ranch, Arrowhead Lakes, Sun City, Sun City West, Surprise and Peoria, specifically Peoria above Northern 21 Avenue should be in Congressional District 8. Downtown 22 23 Glendale should be moved back to Congressional District 3. 24 The boundary line for Congressional District 8 should be 25 moved back to I-17.

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1 And I should have stated that I'm currently in 2 LD-22, with the new maps I'll be moved to LD-27. 3 Earlier Bonnie -- I think her last name was Angster, she was the fifth speaker -- she was very specific 4 in the details for LD-27 and CD-8 with -- with the 5 6 boundaries and I just want to state that I'm in agreement 7 with those. 8 And my last statement is that I would like to 9 request that you please draw your maps for our congressional 10 districts and our legislative districts compactly and always keep our communities' best interest at heart. 11 12 Thank you. 13 (Applause.) 14 SPEAKER MILLER: Yeah, so I'm afraid I'm going to 15 plow through some of the same ground we've already done but 16 I think at this point it's largely unavoidable to have to do 17 that. 18 My name is James Miller; I live in Peoria, Maricopa 19 County; I'm currently in Legislative District 22. And I'm 20 here today to give some information about the communities of 21 interest which are important to me and to -- and to my 22 family. 23 I live in Trilogy at Vistancia, so far I think I'm 24 the sole representative for that community, hopefully not 25 the only. It's an age-restricted community made up of

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mostly retired but still quite active people. And Trilogy is very similar with other communities in the general area such as Corte Bella, Sun City West, Sun City, Surprise, Sun City Grand and so on. We usually gather -- we gather much to support local restaurants, arts and entertainment venues, as well as many clubs and groups focusing on a variety of things.

8 In Trilogy we very often avail ourselves of 9 opportunities and interests in the other age-restricted 10 communities near ours. Our interests and activities and 11 general attitudes are often quite similar because we chose 12 places like these to live for a reason and we would like for 13 them to remain to the extent possible as when we moved 14 there.

Please keep our retirement communities in the Northwest Valley in a single congressional district. I understand --

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(Applause.)

I understand the constitutional requirements for redistricting and how difficult your jobs must be to satisfy them, if it's even possible to do so. I would ask that as much weight be given to satisfying geographic compactness, contiguousness, respecting of communities of interest and the use of visible features and boundaries to -- as much as to equal population and certainly district competitiveness.

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These two latter requirements will eventually satisfy themselves anyway with the natural in-and-out movements within the district anyway.

Thank you for your time today and for your efforts in this once-in-a-decade exercise.

Thank you.

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(Applause.)

SPEAKER MORGAN: Hi, my name is Eric Morgan, I'm an engineer in -- at Intel Corporation in Chandler but I live in north Glendale. I've attended a couple hearings now and I hear a lot of people talking about competitive districts. I mean, why not, we've grown up believing that 50/50 is fair, right? But when you're talking representation, 50/50 is not fair. 50/50 is the way you guarantee that the most number of people dislike any given decision.

(Applause.)

Many people are calling for competitive districts 17 18 to have someone fight for their school funding and other 19 specific things, but competitive districts don't do that. 20 The representatives can never take a stand, they can never 21 fight for anyone, they always have to take a weak middle of the ground -- middle-of-the-road position that they think 22 23 won't upset anyone and in the end neither constituency is 24 ever happy with their decisions. Either that or they have 25 to choose between the interests of two differing parties and

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1 that's not really fair to anyone.

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When we were shopping for our homes, we check our schools, our businesses, churches, how many kids are around, even interview neighbors to choose a spot that fits us. Splitting us up and dividing our representation on purpose is not fair.

I'm in District 27 and quite simply it's just too There are two distinct communities in this far east. district: A younger crew east of 59th Avenue interested in fighting for our schools; while the west, the retirement 10 community, is worried about living on a fixed income. They 12 hold opposite positions on property taxes for example. How 13 is a representative supposed to deal with that?

14 Instead of pitting us against each other in the 15 same districts, give us two separate representatives who 16 understand us and whose job it is to work out these differences. 17

18 Sliding 27 to the west to encompass parts of 19 Sun City accomplishes that. Incorporating Surprise and the 20 surrounding areas into CD-8 has the similar effects for 21 congressional districts. You cannot force a district to be competitive without being political and that's not really 22 23 fair to the Commission to be put in a position to have to 24 make political calls like that. By selecting districts 25 based on the interests of the citizens who have already

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chosen where they want to live, it's all about people and not politics. I humbly ask you to put people in front of politics.

Thank you.

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(Applause.)

SPEAKER MORGAN: Good evening. First, I'd like to thank each of you for the work you're doing on this Commission and an opportunity for myself and others to address the Commission on behalf of our communities.

My name is Heather Morgan, I've been a resident of my community from 1994. In that time we've watched our community age and three children and neighborhood friends leave to start their own lives.

These days we have much more in common with the neighborhood just west of us, Sun City. Our concerns and goals are much more aligned. We have reached that point in our life where we are concerned with things like living on a fixed income, not having outrageous taxes to pay for things we don't need nor will we use, and also medical care geared to the issues of growing older.

Already we spend more of our time west of us, even all the way out to Surprise, and never really do anything in the communities to our east except go around them on the 101. The community just to our east is inhabited by a much younger generation who are in earlier stages of their lives,

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many starting families and careers. The concerns of this younger generation is at odds with our concerns, as their concerns will be more centered on schools, parks, activities for children, and job opportunities for example.

I would also like to point out that Surprise has nothing in common with the far west side of rural Arizona and is an urban community much more in line with the area south of it -- I guess a suburban community. I put that wrong.

Given those differences I would ask that our community be shifted into the same district as Sun City and Surprise and be shifted into the district south of it. It just makes more sense and aligns better those communities with common interests, thus allowing all those communities to be better represented by the elected officials.

The goal should be to make sure that the most people we can are represented as best we can in the most compact districts possible so that they can best work together for the good of their community.

I thank you for taking my testimony intoconsideration in deciding the outcome of the maps.

Thank you.

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(Applause.)

SPEAKER BLACK: My name is Susan Black and I want to thank the Commission here for all of your hard work and

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diligence.

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I'm a 12-year-old -- 12-year resident and business owner in the Sun City area. I'm also a Realtor and see various demographics throughout the West Valley and the Metro Valley areas and also the rural communities. I'm a precinct committeeman in LD-22 currently. I'm committed to impart and create strong communities.

It is important to recognize the differences in the retirement communities and the metro suburban family communities versus rural communities. Our legislative districts are where our retired folks live, play, worship, entertain, and receive medical attention. We receive the majority of our services within a ten-mile radius.

We have different needs, struggles and concerns than rural areas in Mohave County and La Paz County or other highly populated urban Central Phoenix areas. Also, Maricopa County does not share anything in common with Arizona surrounding counties, and those boundaries should never be intertwined.

Please draw our maps with close proximity to where we live, work and play. I believe this is very important and it's important that the -- follow the Arizona Constitution should be Commission's only focus instead of seeking party competitiveness like they have in the past. We -- we want fair representation. It's

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1 entirely -- that's what we would like. 2 Thank you for hearing me and good luck in your 3 decisions. 4 (Applause.) 5 MS. NEUMANN: Our next five speakers are Mary G, Amber Hilliker, Corinne Haines, Nathan and his last name 6 7 starts with an M, Marylouise Stevens. 8 Mary? 9 SPEAKER HILLIKER: No, Amber. 10 MS. NEUMANN: Mary here? 11 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: No, she's gone. MS. NEUMANN: Okay Amber, you're up. Go ahead. 12 13 SPEAKER HILLIKER: Hello, my name is Amber 14 Hilliker. I'm a wife and mother of two, my husband works 15 for Maricopa County, I'm an independent agent that helps 16 people with sustainable tax and retirement; and I can work 17 anywhere in the state of Arizona. 18 My children attend a private school in Glendale; I 19 do not like the direction the public schools have taken, so 20 I've chosen the school that offers good curriculum. We live off of 75th Avenue and Cactus in Peoria. I don't remember 21 the new district number but it's been 21 for the last ten 22 23 years, Senator Gray is my senator. 24 My church -- and I liked what you had to say, 25 Senator.

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My church that I attend is in Glendale and my school that my children attend are in Glendale. Our children have played sports with the Peoria city sports and Christ Church of the Valley sports teams. Currently our daughters participate in cross country with her (verbatim) school. All my children's sports teams have either been in Peoria or Glendale -- and when I mention Glendale, I'm speaking of Glendale north of Northern Avenue.

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9 We typically support businesses off 83rd Avenue 10 south of Bell Road; sometimes we support businesses at 11 Westgate and Glendale. We go occasionally to Avondale but 12 we typically stay around our home and we never travel south 13 of the I-10 to support businesses. The I-10 -- south of the 14 I-10 is high in crime, and it's extremely different than the 15 part of town that I live in.

I would like to see that the boundaries of Congressional District 8 -- Sun City, Surprise, Peoria -are kept together. I believe the eastern boundary -boundary, like everybody else, should end around I-17.

And when we're speaking about the legislative district, again I think Sun City, Peoria should be kept in the same district and the eastern boundary should end about 67th Avenue.

24The lines that were drawn about ten years ago were25not equal in population. Some districts have upwards of

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1 10 percent and more -- or more in populations than other 2 districts; districts should accurately represent communities 3 of interest. I think you've heard that. So I want to thank you for your time today 4 5 listening to us. 6 (Applause.) 7 SPEAKER MESS: Hi, my name is Nate Mess. I live in 8 85387. 9 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Closer to the mic. 10 MS. NEUMANN: Into the mic, please. 11 SPEAKER MESS: Can you hear me? 12 My name is Nate Mess. I live in 85387. T live 13 in -- and I agree with much of what's been said here today 14 but a little bit of a different perspective, okay? 15 I live in an unincorporated area of Maricopa County 16 northwest of Surprise, and I work in northwest Phoenix and 17 North Central Phoenix. I spend my free time working on my 18 property; I do a lot of hunting and fishing, camping and 19 hiking. I enjoy going to the mountains but I also spend a 20 lot of time in the desert around my home. My community is largely made up of service, health, 21 and construction workers as well as retired folks who enjoy 22 23 the rural life. Many of us in the community have livestock, 24 horses, chickens and other interests. Most of us have 25 boats, campers, motor homes, off-road vehicles. We're able

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to pursue our interests because we keep these things right on our property. For instance, if I want to go fishing, I hook up the boat and I go, I don't have to go to a storage lot before and after the trip.

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The hour-long commute to where I work passes through many densely populated areas. When I see a lot of homelessness, bus lines, speed bumps, traffic lights, HOAs with their rules and regulations -- and did I mention traffic lights?

People are not permitted to have chickens or campers on their property even if they wanted to. People in my community choose to live where we do for the openness, the peacefulness and the rural lifestyle, free from these restrictions. I'm asking you to respect that and I'm asking for representation.

I have a lot more in common with Wickenburg than I do with -- I agree that these lines need to be brought west, 28 and 9 are the ones I'm talking about.

I hear a lot about competitive districting.
MS. NEUMANN: That's time, sir.
SPEAKER MESS: But I only got halfway. Thank you.
(Applause.)
MS. NEUMANN: I'll take that.
SPEAKER MESS: There you go. Thank you.
SPEAKER HAINES: Hello, my name is Corinne Haines.

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I live in Maricopa County and I'm here today to give you information about my community of interest.

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I live off of El Mirage and Vistancia Boulevard just north of the 303 and Happy Valley Road in Peoria. My community is made up of families and retirees. Because of the proximity of the 303, the 101 and the I-17 families can work close to home but also have easy access to work in neighboring towns.

My community offers many activities in which both families and retirees can interact and enhance our quality of life.

12 In my community we play together, we work together; 13 we attend neighborhood churches and our kids attend schools in like districts. Many Friday nights families gather 14 15 together at CCV where their children compete in sports 16 events. On these evenings we encounter all kinds of friends 17 that we've grown up with, gone to school with and share 18 common values and goals. It's like living in a small town 19 within a big city. We choose to live here because we share 20 so much in common with those in our community and it's 21 important that we have representation who understands and shares our values. 22

During the last redistricting our community was literally split right down the middle. If you lived on one side of the street, you were in a different congressional

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district than the other side of the street. It was 1 2 confusing and didn't make sense. 3 The West Valley needs to be whole again. In the draft map --4 5 (Applause.) -- Congressional District 8 has been split but 6 7 there can be -- it can be corrected simply by moving some of 8 the boundary lines to the left or west uniting Surprise, 9 Sun City West, Sun City, Peoria and Autumn Ridge into the same district. South Glendale and urban Glendale are 10 11 totally different communities of interest and would be 12 better served by being a part of Central Phoenix or CD-3 13 where they share similar interests. 14 Thank you for giving me the opportunity to give 15 input and hopefully we can correct the mistakes made ten 16 years ago and making it fair for all Arizonans. 17 Thank you. 18 (Applause.) 19 SPEAKER STEVENS: My name is Marylouise Stevens, I 20 live in Sun City. I've lived in other parts of the county and I can 21 22 attest that each community, each area, is very unique. Ι 23 can't imagine that we have anything in common with the 24 proposed extension into the west part of the state of 25 Arizona. One of our big fears I think -- I've picked up on,

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is that our representative in the new congressional districts will not represent our interests. Perhaps the presumption is that that representative will be from the western part of the state.

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If we were successful and we had a representative elected from the eastern part, which would be our communities, then I would feel sorry for the people living in the western part of the state, they're in the same congressional districts and they wouldn't have informed representation simply based on the distance and how spread out -- physically spread out the communities are, much less to talk about the different interests.

One of the gentlemen talked about -- in Yavapai talked about water being a huge issue. Well, I can see that our interests in water and our communities will be quite a bit different and extremely important to us, just as they will be for the people living in the western part of the state that would now be in the same congressional district and I don't believe that it serves anyone well.

Thank you for your time.

(Applause.)

MS. NEUMANN: Our next five speakers are Chad Moreland, Laura Basey, Barbara Schis- -- Schwisow, Chris Judd, Fleeta Cullins, and Mary Ziola.

SPEAKER MORELAND: Hello, my name is Chad Moreland

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and I live in LD-22 and Congressional District 8. I've been in Arizona and Glendale for just over six years and I encompass what a lot of the communities are in those areas in that I'm former Air Force, so I have ties to Luke Air Force Base.

I was a caregiver for my mom and I brought her here and she lived over in Sun City West, so it's important; and there's a lot of folks that I know that have ties to that area that would like to remain tied through the -- their congressional districts to that area.

And I'm also a cyber security specialist so -and as part of LD-22, my church, a lot of my coworkers live in the what's going to be LD-28; and as the Taiwan semiconductor community comes in, that's going to expand even more and I believe that it's important that LD-22, instead of decreasing and being split into three different districts that -- that it -- it remains a part of the -- the northern part of that LD-28 below 303.

Thank you.

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(Applause.)

SPEAKER BASEY: Hi there, my name is Laura Basey and I appreciate the opportunity to address you.

Seventeen years ago next week my husband and I came here to visit and ended up buying a house. We moved here from California and we stayed with friends in Surprise and

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ended up moving into northern Peoria. All of our friends live in those areas and cross those boundaries, and the way the districts are being split up doesn't make sense to us.

We came here to retire eventually -- which will happen soon. And all -- a lot of our friends are already retired, they live in Vistancia, they live in Surprise, they live in Sun City West, Sun City Grand, and we just see the value of the representation of one district in those areas.

So I just want to let you know that we really are unhappy with having to split these up and would like to keep it the same. And so it would -- I also agree with Carol Ayotte and Rick Morgan and Heather Morgan, I thought their points were very good, so.

Thank you for the opportunity.

(Applause.)

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SPEAKER JOHNSON: I agree with Eric and Mr. Van Steenwyk.

Anyway, my name is Barbara Schwisow Johnson, I live in Maricopa County, Sun City West. I live on Heritage Drive near Grand Avenue and the 303 freeway.

21 We are retired, older, fixed-income citizens 22 interested in representation that recognizes our 23 demographics and like interests and activities. I find it 24 unfair to link -- link us to values and interests that do 25 not reflect our population-based values. It is much more

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just to have representation that reflects us as a community -- I'm not a public speaker.

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I'm 68 years old, semiretired registered nurse. I have just moved here from Washington state and own a home here in Sun City West. I share community values with Sun City, El Mirage, Sun City Grand, and my home in Sun City West. I am connected to areas like Luke Air Force Base. My ZIP Code is 85375.

9 I have interests with residents of my community, we're retired on a fixed income, church active, community 10 11 active and interested in a peaceful community. We're 12 basically not commuters and have no bus, train, or commuter 13 needs. We feel it is unfair to put our population with 14 areas of interest in conflict with our values and lifestyle. 15 We enjoy aquatic, golf, theater, dance, Eagles and American 16 Legion clubs, singing groups, and especially our church 17 activities. We're independent in our thinking, evaluating 18 each issue for its pros and cons. We prefer representation 19 that understands our community needs. We ask to be best 20 stratified with like population.

As a community we're not taxed under school systems as our population is not school-involved. We do have close to 20 grandchildren involved in school systems from Washington state to Florida. We have definite values involving the management of our school system.

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Our free time includes churches, friendship, golf, singing, theater, military connections to Eagles and American Legion Club. It's best and most fair to not form disconnected and chaotic districts but like-minded communities who represent and support our value systems and independent thinking.

My husband is Norwegian -- and I'm very nervous -and I am Dutch. My parents lived through Hitler's atrocities, my country represents the hiding place of Anne Frank, my parents and myriad of aunts and uncles seared into my memory the atrocities of that time.

I ask you to follow the six criteria, know that competitiveness does not mean conflict -- add conflict, adhere to population numbers and do not link communities of conflicting values and lifestyles.

Thank you.

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(Applause.)

18 SPEAKER ZIOLA: My name is Mary Ziola and I'm a 19 retired citizen of Surprise, Arizona, living in a retirement 20 community. I do most of my social and healthcare activities 21 in Surprise, Arizona. I feel Surprise should be included 22 with the common interests of Congressional District 8 with 23 the Sun City, Sun City West, and Sun City Grand and should 24 be kept together.

Thank you.

(Applause.)

SPEAKER JUDD: Good evening, Commissioners. My name is Chris Judd. I live in Surprise. I serve on the Surprise City Council and I would like to echo the comments made by Senator Rick Gray. I thought he made some great points.

Specifically my concern is with the congressional district. City of Surprise is a very urban area, northern and western Arizona is a very rural area, and we would not have very good representation if we had -- if we had an elected official from Surprise trying to represent them or them trying to represent us. So if you can, move CD-8 out to include Surprise.

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Thank you.

(Applause.)

16 SPEAKER CULLINS: My name is Fleeta Cullins. Ι 17 live in 85383, the address is Peoria but it is up in 18 Vistancia. That is an active adult community, family 19 community; we live, work, shop in Surprise, Peoria. We are 20 more aligned with the Sun Cities, including Sun City Festival which I'm moving to, so I don't want to 21 leave my area really, but it -- it -- I do not understand 22 23 why we would be moved to some place so far away to the west 24 that I didn't even know exists and whoever represents that 25 area cannot possibly represent the people that live in

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Surprise, northern Peoria --1 2 (Applause.) 3 -- northern Glendale and the northern part of Peoria. So, please, just keep us together. 4 5 Okay. 6 (Applause.) We're now going to take a five-minute 7 MS. NEUMANN: 8 break and give our transcriptionist a little rest and we 9 will continue back at 7:34 promptly. (Recess taken from 7:30 p.m. to 7:37 p.m.) 10 11 12 MS. NEUMANN: Okay. Folks, we're going to get 13 started. 14 If everyone can be seated, we're going to get 15 started again. 16 Our next five speakers are Mary Ann Johnston, 17 Barbara Wyllie, Summer Baker, Merri Banks, and Gerard 18 Johnson. 19 Mary Ann? 20 SPEAKER JOHNSTON: Good evening. My name is Mary 21 Ann Johnston. Not only do I live in Maricopa County but both my husband and I were born and raised in Maricopa 22 23 County, 60 years native. 24 (Applause.) 25 We have lived west of I-17 between Peoria and

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Cactus off of 31st Avenue since 2005. We spend several evenings a month supporting our friend's restaurant, attending car shows along 67th Avenue and Bell. Since we moved to the area in '05, we've always shopped at the Albertson's on 51st Avenue and Cactus, Sprouts at 51st and Peoria until they recently moved to 33rd and Thunderbird. Our interests, activities and shopping are primarily west and/or northwest of I-17, even though we're still hanging in there and trying to support the businesses along the now-demised Metro Center.

Districts should represent those who have chosen to live in a specific area based on accessibility of their interests and I do not belong in the Sunnyslope district which is a densely populated area and caters to more of a Hispanic community. I've always been a part of the West Valley community and I'd like to stay that way, therefore I feel LD-2 needs to stay west from I-17 to 67th Avenue and Congressional 8 should be I-17 west and to include Peoria and Surprise and not east of I-17.

Thank you for your time in considering my concerns and as you move to adhere to all six of the criteria laid out in the Constitution.

Thank you.

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(Applause.)

SPEAKER WYLLIE: Hi, I'm Barbara Wyllie. I have

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lived in the Northwest Valley for 51 years. I'm on the West-MEC school board and have been for seven or eight years. I belong to the Catholic church in Sun City West and most of my family and friends live in the Northwest Valley.

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On the West-MEC board I represent -- it's a huge area that I represent, it goes from Wickenburg to Tonopah to Buckeye, so I get out into those communities. It's a fantastic program, it's -- it's great and it is primarily in the West Valley.

During the last redistricting, Vistancia community was split right down the middle. If you lived on one side of the street, you were in a different congressional district than the other side of the street. This never made any sense.

Congressional District 8 has been split but this can be corrected by moving the boundary lines to the left -or west -- to unite Surprise, Sun City West, Sun City, and Peoria into the same district.

20 South Glendale and urban Glendale are totally 21 different communities of interest and would be better served 22 by being a part of Central Phoenix, CD-3, where they have 23 similar interests.

The people I share my life with have the same values, morals and interests; please keep us together,

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1 intact and compact.

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Thanks for what you're doing and call me if I can help. Thank you.

(Applause.)

SPEAKER BANKS: Good evening, my name is Mary Banks. I live in Surprise, I've lived there about six years; I've lived in Arizona about 27 years.

I'm not going to try to address legislative districts but my concern is the Congressional District 9 and that's where I would be and the concern is what -- I agree with everybody has said about keeping the Northwest Valley together, but I have a little bit different solution. I appreciate that whatever you do is going to make a lot of people mad and you're not going to satisfy everybody and you are constrained to keep the population of the congressional districts fairly equal.

So you can't just add 200,000 people to CD-8, you 17 18 have to change something else. So you have two 19 congressional districts in Arizona that are wildly 20 uncompetitive and they happen to abut, it's CD-3 and CD-9. So my suggestion would be that CD-3 be extended up what is 21 really the main artery of the whole Northwest Valley, U.S. 22 23 60 Grand Avenue, and include those communities that really 24 center on that avenue. I don't know if you can make it out 25 to Wickenburg, but out that way -- and then you give CD-9

areas of CD-3 which are south of I-10, which are more rural. 1 2 Just for your consideration. Thank you. 3 (Applause.) SPEAKER BAKER: Hello, my name is -- hello, my name 4 is Summer Baker. I'm a PC in the current LD-26 and I spoke 5 last night and I just want to reiterate what I had said. 6 7 I want to stress the importance of compact 8 geographic areas, areas of interest and the respect to city 9 and town boundaries which are three of the six requirements 10 this Commission must follow when redrawing the districts. I live off of Baseline Road and Mill Avenue and my 11 12 community is made up of middle class single-family homes. 13 We have many people that travel to Ahwatukee, south Tempe, 14 and west Chandler for school and work. We share similar 15 priorities, interests and values amongst ourselves. We 16 support local businesses, restaurants in those areas and we 17 hardly travel into north Tempe, the college area or into 18 Mesa for any activity. 19 The city of Tempe is very different above and below 20 the Broadway Road and east and west of Price Road. Last time around, my community was grouped into an LD that had 21 other parts of the metro area whose communities did not 22 23 frequently participate in what I would consider on the other 24 side of town.

A large part of the previous district was the

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Salt River Indian Reservation who mostly do their daily activities in parts of Mesa and southeast Scottsdale. Your current LD-8 draft map version 10 has my community grouped in such a way again.

I propose that specific -- that that specific LD-8 be broken up to best serve the points I stressed in the beginning. Include the reservation into LD-9 and 10, draft map version 10, and include south of the U.S. 60 into LD-12 of the draft map version 10. I ask that you exclude the panhandle of the LD-12 and draw the boundary at the Price 101 freeway.

Furthermore the districts -- the districts the previous Commission drew were not compact, did not have equal population, and were too focused on competitiveness. I do not want this to happen to us again. Competitive districts should be considered as long as the other five requirements are prioritized first.

18 Please follow the Arizona Constitution when you are 19 redrawing the districts this time.

Thank you for your time.

(Applause.)

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22 SPEAKER JOHNSON: My name is Gerard Johnson, I'm a 23 resident of Sun City West and I'll admit I'm a recent 24 arrival in Arizona, I've only lived here as a permanent 25 resident for three or four years. However, I lived in a

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state where there was terrific gerrymandering and I thought I had left it behind.

And I'm not going to be -- take a stand one way or the other on gerrymandering, what I am concerned is that the -- what -- it's a difficult task, it's very Solomonesque that you have to do, but I do join with all my friends and neighbors here who oppose putting Congressional District 8 in Congressional District 9.

9 I've lived here and visited here long enough to know that I have very little in common with the people in 10 11 Lake Havasu. They're fine people; the same with the people 12 in Quartzsite and Yuma and all along the western border. 13 However, as a community of interest, I think it's more 14 important to keep the Sun Cities together with Surprise with 15 the areas that are now currently in Congressional 16 District 8.

I support what Lynn Peters --

(Applause.)

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19 I support what Lynn Peters and others have said, 20 really please don't join parts of Congressional District 8 with Congressional District 9, and I really do sincerely --21 I know it's difficult but I really hope you do listen to us 22 23 and take what we say to heart.

24 I -- I can't repeat everything that everybody else has said, I -- I think I have time or it's not clicking,

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1 somebody didn't turn it on.

MS. NEUMANN: I gotcha. I gotcha. SPEAKER JOHNSON: So what, I have how many seconds? MS. NEUMANN: You've got 20 seconds left. SPEAKER JOHNSON: Thank you for listening to me, I

appreciate it.

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(Applause.)

MS. NEUMANN: Our next five speakers are Eva Walecka, Anj Patterson, Greg Rucker, Larry Templeton, and Melissa Karner. 10

SPEAKER WALECKA: Good evening. My name is Eva Walecka, I have been a resident of Maricopa County for over 30 years. I live in current Legislative District 22 and proposed LD-27 in Glendale.

15 My neighborhood is made up of retirees as well as 16 families with young children who attend schools in either 17 Deer Valley or Peoria school districts. My community of 18 interest, east-west boundaries are 67th Avenue to 99th Avenue on both sides of Bell Road. North boundary is Lake 19 20 Pleasant and Happy Valley Road to 67th Avenue where my kids go to school. We seldom travel below Thunderbird Road or 21 east of 67th Avenue. 22

23 I think that districts should be compact to 24 accurately represent communities of interest and people who 25 live and work there. I chose to live in my community

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because it was safe, clean, and included like-minded people who enjoy family -- quiet family time as well as quick access to local hospitals and shops.

I think that the western boundary of proposed LD-27 should move west to El Mirage Road as it will better unite Peoria and Sun City. It makes sense that the retirement communities should be in the same congressional district, CD-8.

We need to put north Glendale, Peoria, Surprise, Sun City West, Sun City Grand in the same district. The I-17 ideally should be the eastern boundary of proposed Congressional District 8 and Northern should be kept the southern border of District 8, as we do not have much in common with Downtown Glendale.

Thank you very much for your time.

(Applause.)

MS. NEUMANN: Anj Patterson?

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Greg Rucker.

20 SPEAKER RUCKER: My -- this is my first time 21 testifying. So my name is Greg Rucker. I live in the north 22 end of Glendale in the Arrowhead Lakes community in the 23 Beardsley precinct. My primary concern is the West Valley 24 as a community.

It is common to hear people speak in terms of the

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East Valley, Phoenix, or again the West Valley. The grid maps had me and my neighbors in LD-28 and the latest versions appear to show us in LD-27; in either case, there's a single string of Phoenix precincts included along the eastern border of those legislative districts. In my humble opinion, LD-28 and LD-27 should be moved west or north and those city of Phoenix precincts included with the Phoenix legislative district.

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9 Why? For example, the area below Bell Road west of 51st Avenue is entirely in the Peoria Unified School 10 11 District. One of my neighbors -- we're north of there. But 12 one of my neighbors two houses down runs the library in Zuni 13 Hills Elementary of PUSD north of here on 107th Avenue. My 14 immediate -- immediate neighbor in the same direction is 15 administrator of another school in PUSD. I, myself, am soon 16 to be assisting with a science program at Heritage Elementary, again in PUSD. How -- I'd like to also caution 17 18 that much of my neighborhood as it's been described can be 19 described as a retirement community and I'm getting there 20 myself, so I -- that's an add-in.

Talking about congressional districts, the church I attend is not far north of here, the church building is in the proposed congressional district that runs all the way to Lake Havasu City. The pastor lives in a proposed congressional district that runs into Phoenix.

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So would you please consider creating a compact 1 2 congressional district that covers the West Valley as a 3 community. 4 Thank you. 5 (Applause.) Is Larry Templeton here? 6 MS. NEUMANN: 7 Okay. Thank you. SPEAKER TEMPLETON: Hello, I'm Larry Templeton. 8 Ι 9 live in Surprise. I used to live in the Chicago area where 10 I worked before I came to Surprise. I do not want to be 11 part of Phoenix, please do not move our lines down toward 12 Phoenix. 13 Second, I'm retired now, I would like for 14 retirement districts like Festival, Sun City, 15 Sun City Grand, areas like that to be together, it makes 16 sense. 17 They should be as compact as they possibly can. 18 Now, think of the -- the map that tries to take us out to 19 California, that -- that's no good. We need to stay in 20 Congressional District 8, and we need Legislative District 8 21 not to go south. Okay? Please do consider our areas of interest. Please 22 23 consider the community we chose to live in and want to 24 continue to live in. I do not want to live in Chicago; I 25 don't want to have my representative from Phoenix. Okay?

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1 Thank you. 2 (Applause.) 3 MS. NEUMANN: Melissa. SPEAKER KARNER: Hi, my name is Melissa Karner. 4 Ι 5 live in Surprise, Arizona. I have lived in Surprise for 17 years. I have three children which are all attending 6 7 either high school or community college. One is attending 8 Shadow Ridge in the Dysart School District and the other is 9 attending Estrella Community College in Avondale. 10 Surprise has been an inner-connected city with Sun City, El Mirage, Waddell, Sun City West, Sun City Grand. 11 We 12 all hold a common interest. We are a large part of the West 13 Valley, we work together, drive together, shop together, 14 live and share similar values with other West Valley families. 15 16 With that said, as I have reviewed the draft maps, 17 I request District 9 be compacted to remove Lake Havasu, 18 Peach Springs, Kingman, Colorado City. These cities are way 19 too far west and north to have anything in common with our 20 community. We need to have D-9 much smaller and only include the cities I mentioned -- West Valley, Maricopa 21 22 County. 23 Our districts should be compact to accurately

represent communities of interest who live and work together. For example, what common interests do we have

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with the city of Dolan Springs or Peach Springs? Not a lot, 1 2 and I'm sure they're beautiful. These small town 3 communities function totally different than our inner-connected West Valley cities of Maricopa County. 4 5 In conclusion, please consider making these maps smaller as to not break up like communities and add 6 7 communities that are too far to have anything in common with 8 like-minded communities. 9 Thank you and I appreciate your time. 10 (Applause.) 11 MS. NEUMANN: Our last three speakers are Larry 12 Thomas, Donald Madison, and Tom Berry. 13 Larry? 14 SPEAKER THOMAS: That's me. 15 Hi, I'm Larry Thomas. I've resided in Arizona 16 since 2008 (verbatim). After taking a job with the public works department in the city of Surprise in 2003, I moved to 17 18 the West Valley. Later I worked for the State and retired 19 from public service in 2017. 20 I want to speak about CD-9. To create the new 21 ninth congressional district, the draft map peels off part of highly urbanized Metro Phoenix and dumps its residents to 22 23 a far-flung geographic entity and this has already been 24 spoken of on several occasions. 25 This sprawling CD-9 encompasses vast deserts and

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range lands, agriculture areas, Native American tribes and hundreds of miles along the Colorado River. This contradicts the requirement for creating compact districts.

The new district includes almost the entire Colorado River area from north to south but it excludes the city of Yuma. The driving distance from Wellton at the southernmost boundary of this district up to Saint George, Utah, at the northern boundary is approximately 400 miles, which is a seven-hour drive one way.

10 Furthermore the current analysis by the IRC shows 11 new CD-9 is outside of the competitiveness range, they say it leans towards one political party. It would be more 12 13 correct to say that the new CD-9 is completely dominated by 14 one party and will remain so for the foreseeable future. 15 Any candidate running on the ticket of the dominant party 16 will have zero incentive to address the needs and desires of 17 those Arizonans supporting a different party. As a 18 registered Independent, this total lack of political 19 competitiveness is deeply unsettling. 20 MS. NEUMANN: That's time, sir. Thank vou.

(Applause.)

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22 SPEAKER MADISON: My name is Don Madison. I'm not 23 a native of Arizona, I was -- moved here in 1946 when I was 24 three years old.

I've lived in Maricopa County for approximately

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60 years, sometimes in California in the military. I live currently in Surprise, in Sun City Grand, we've been there since 2004.

I strongly believe that we need to maintain things as they have been, like many people have said tonight. Ι know you have a thankless task, it's very difficult to do this in a way that's going to satisfy everyone, but I believe you should consider the fact that all of us that are retired, living on fixed incomes, live our little communities in a very compact and sort of nice way.

And so God bless you all, I hope you do well and thank you for letting me speak.

(Applause.)

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SPEAKER BERRY: Good evening, my name is Tom Berry and I live in Trilogy in Vistancia, which is a 55-plus community that's been talked about a lot this evening and I'm very glad to hear my neighbors and friends standing up and trying to give you the message about our retirement communities.

I'm actually glad I'm the last speaker because I want to leave you with an analogy that you will probably remember and I hope it helps you remember us.

23 The retirement communities of Sun City Grand, Sun 24 City, Sun City Festival, Sun City West, Vistancia, Corte Bella and so on, we're like a beehive. When the sun

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comes up, we leave the hive and go out into community; when 1 2 the sun goes down, we're back in the hive and most of us 3 should be there right now. Please, please don't throw us out in the desert 4 5 with the mosquitoes and the stagnant water. Please don't 6 put us in the anthill with the red and black ants, let them 7 figure that out. 8 And by all means, please don't put any of us in the 9 bat cave because none of us will make it. 10 (Applause.) 11 COMMISSIONER LERNER: That was a great way to end a 12 great meeting. 13 So we want to thank you all for all of your 14 testimony, participating in the process. We appreciate all 15 of your comments and that you came out to provide us with 16 your input. 17 We remind you that you will be able to also, if you 18 want to continue to put input we have our website, you 19 can -- if you receive the documents, please go ahead and 20 submit those online. We'll be continuing to work for the 21 next month or so. 22 And with that, we are adjourned. Thank you all. 23 COMMISSIONER MEHL: Thank you. 24 (Applause.) 25
