1 <u>P</u> <u>R</u> <u>O</u> <u>C</u> <u>E</u> <u>E</u> <u>D</u> <u>I</u> <u>N</u> <u>G</u> 2 3 MS. VAN HAREN: Okay. Welcome, everybody. We are 4 starting the virtual town hall. We are going to first introduce our interpreter and 5 then kind of explain, we have a little bit of a different 6 7 setup right now. In the chat function I have put the 8 first -- all of the names of everybody who is signed up to 9 speak and then also we have the phone number for anybody who 10 needs to call in. So I'll turn it over to our interpreter to explain 11 12 everything. 13 THE INTERPRETER: (Spanish language.) 14 Hello, this is Gabriel Contreras. I am the Spanish 15 interpreter. 16 MS. VAN HAREN: Perfect. In the chat function, 17 Gabriel, can you explain that there's a phone number that 18 they can call with a PIN and they can call in if they want 19 to hear everything in Spanish. 20 THE INTERPRETER: (Spanish language.) 21 MS. VAN HAREN: Perfect. Thank you. 22 THE INTERPRETER: Thank you. 23 MS. VAN HAREN: At this point we'll send it over to 24 Commissioner Mehl to start the meeting. 25 COMMISSIONER MEHL: I'd like to welcome everyone

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who is here to speak with us today. I now call to order the 1 2 virtual town hall. We do have a transcriptionist who will 3 be recording every word, so please speak slowly and clearly so that we will have a clear record of your input. 4 At this time we will introduce ourselves. 5 I am Commissioner David Mehl and I'm from Pima County. 6 7 CHAIRPERSON NEUBERG: Hello, everyone. I am 8 Chairwoman Erika Neuberg and I live in Chandler, Maricopa 9 County. 10 COMMISSIONER MEHL: And we have had many public 11 meetings this week and we look forward to hearing additional 12 input today. 13 So now we move on to Agenda Item II, public 14 comments. 15 Staff will describe the format of the meeting and 16 read the rules. Thank you. MS. VAN HAREN: Thank you, Commissioner Mehl. 17 18 So we are going to take -- everybody who registered 19 is going to be able to speak today and we will give everyone 20 two minutes to speak. 21 If you are not signed in under the name that you 22 registered as, I would recommend that you log out and 23 re-sign in under the name that you registered because we 24 will -- may not be able to see you. If you can't do that, 25 go ahead and enter your chat message in the chat box and we

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should be able to circle back and -- and see you in there and we'll be able to call you.

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If you're having any audio issues, I would recommend doing the same thing in the chat box. We can absolutely see you and -- and make sure that we call you.

And once you are finished, we will go ahead and mute you.

In compliance with Arizona's open meeting laws, speakers should confine their statements to the issue on the posted agenda which is before the Commission. Speakers are also requested to limit their comments to approximately two minutes. The two minutes will be strictly enforced for all speakers.

Additionally speakers are required to follow proper decorum. Speakers must use appropriate language. Foul and/or abusive language will not be tolerated. Any speaker failing to follow -- I'm sorry.

Any speaker failing to follow proper decorum or any other guidelines may be asked to leave. Any breach of the peace or disruption of the Commission public hearing may be caused for report to law enforcement.

If somebody has expressed the same sentiment you wish to express, you may say so and your comments will be recorded. If you have already spoken at previous meetings, your comments were recorded in the public record.

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Opposing viewpoints may be expressed by the 1 citizens present. As a courtesy, citizens are reminded to 2 3 address their comments to the Chair and to the Commission 4 and not to the audience present. 5 Please show respect for all speakers and avoid personal comments. Remember, the Commission must hear all 6 7 sides of an issue to make an informed decision. 8 We will now begin public comment and I'm going to 9 read the first names of the first speaker; and, again, we 10 put them in the chat box there. 11 So the first speaker, William Bowlus-Root. 12 SPEAKER ROOT: Hi, Commissioners. Can you hear me 13 today? 14 MS. VAN HAREN: We can hear you. Please proceed. 15 SPEAKER ROOT: Okay. My name is William 16 Bowlus-Root, that's B-O-W-L-U-S dash R-O-O-T. 17 And I'm a retired software engineer in Yuma, 18 Arizona 85365, which is currently in CD-4 and LD-13 and 19 would be in the proposed CD-7 and LD-23. 20 I've heard people talking of changing the 21 congressional and legislative draft maps to create districts that encompass the entire Colorado River from the top of the 22 23 state to the bottom, I don't think that's a really good 24 idea. 25 While it might seem appealing to make a Colorado

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district like that so our representative can focus on the needs of the entire region, especially the important issue surrounding access to water so they can develop comprehensive policy and programs, I think there's a better way to do that. The needs of northern and southern areas are of such -- those districts are actually very different. The north has a strong tourism industry while the south is primarily agriculture.

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We also have many issues with the border down here in the south that are not really shared with the north. There's really little connecting the two areas either in commerce or in common interest except the river.

My idea is that rather than have one representative working for our mutual benefit in the legislature, it would seem better to have two. If our representatives work together on the issues that face us, we would have double the influence and double the likelihood that we could get the kind of programs that we need.

So don't create a single north-to-southwestern
Colorado River district, keep it two districts so that we'll
have more influence.

Thank you for the opportunity to speak.
MS. VAN HAREN: Thank you.
The next speaker is Patti Van Tuyl.
SPEAKER VAN TUYL: Hello, good afternoon. My name

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is Patti Van Tuyl and I live in the Coconino neighborhood of Flagstaff. We were previously in CD-1, which was one of the most highly competitive districts in the state. We are now in the proposed Congressional District 2, which I believe has been defined without sufficient regard to the criteria for drawing the district lines.

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Commission's own data show that CD-2 is no longer competitive, which means elected officials could easily ignore the voices of those who do not vote for the winning candidates. I believe competition fosters good government and discourages extremism.

CD-2 is no longer compact as it sprawls across the whole of Yavapai County without regard to the geographic barrier presented by Mingus Mountain. Why should Yavapai be kept whole while other counties are not? Areas west of Mingus Mountain do not share the interests such as geography, economy, workforce, healthcare systems, of the community east of the Mingus -- east of the mountain.

Most serious of all, CD-2 dilutes the ability of tribal communities in the north and east to elect a candidate of their choice. In this, it runs afoul of the requirements to comply with the Voting Rights Act. All of the other redistricting criteria are to be met to the degree practicable; this criterion is not. Simply put, districts shall comply with the United States Constitution and the

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1 United States Voting Rights Act, period. 2 The proposed revisions submitted by the 3 Navajo Nation offers a corrective to each of these issues. I would ask you to please consider this map for your 4 5 deliberations. I thank each of you for taking on this important 6 7 and challenging task and for listening. 8 Thank you. 9 MS. VAN HAREN: Thank you. 10 The next speaker is Mayor Paul Deasy. Mayor Deasy, 11 can you hear us? 12 SPEAKER DEASY: Sorry about that. Having issues 13 with the mute button here. 14 Can you hear me? 15 MS. VAN HAREN: Yep, we can hear you. Go ahead. 16 SPEAKER DEASY: Thank you. I just -- I appreciate 17 the opportunity to speak again; and not to belabor, but I 18 wanted to reiterate that the Flagstaff City Council 19 unanimously is in support of the Coconino County's maps 505 20 for the legislative district as well as the congressional 21 district. It is really important that we have competitive districts, not just for Flagstaff but in the surrounding 22 23 community within the Coconino County. 24 In addition, that Flagstaff is very heavily cut off 25 from some of its closest neighbors who shop here, who work

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1 in Flagstaff, who face the same natural disasters, who share 2 the same watershed, and we believe that as a community of 3 interest that we are better represented in that manner with 4 the maps presented by Coconino County. 5 So I would just -- yeah, urge you all to please take that into strong consideration as additional edits 6 7 are -- are made to the redistricting maps. 8 Thank you. 9 MS. VAN HAREN: Thank you. 10 The next three speakers will be Allan Gerston, 11 Linda Guarino and Rennae Ward. 12 Allan, can you hear us? 13 Linda, can you hear us? 14 SPEAKER GERSTON: Oh, I'm sorry. 15 MS. VAN HAREN: Oh, okay, Allan. Go ahead. 16 SPEAKER GERSTON: Okay. Yeah, thanks very much and 17 by the way, you've heard this I'm sure plenty of times but I 18 am pressed -- impressed with the -- the arduous and crazy 19 work that the Commission is doing with all the time and 20 energy that you have to expend for it, so thank you all for 21 that. 22 I just wanted to comment that -- as many of us 23 know, that Arizona's tourism economy is incredibly important 24 up here in the northern part of Arizona and I believe we are second in -- in terms of what is generated in terms of the 25

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economy.

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What troubles me about the map is that Prescott is not part of this economic corridor and it's geographically really quite separated from what we've always known it to be in this area in terms of Flagstaff, Sedona and the Grand Canyon as well as the Verde Valley, really sharing an economic interest.

8 I feel strongly that Prescott should not be 9 included with the same congressional districts as the 10 Grand Canyon corridor in that Prescott is separated from 11 this economic district economically and physically as most 12 of us know to be Mingus Mountain. Prescott should remain as 13 part of the congressional district that also includes the 14 areas of the Colorado River area.

And that's just the short and sweet thought that I have.

Thank you.

MS. VAN HAREN: Thank you.

19 The next speaker is Linda Guarino. Linda, can you 20 hear us? 21 SPEAKER GUARINO: (No audible response.)

MS. VAN HAREN: Please proceed.
 SPEAKER GUARINO: Good morning. My name is Linda
 Guarino and I live in Doney Park, which is part of the
 greater Flagstaff area.

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Arizona already has several what are called safe seats in the current legislative map. One of these is held by Paul Gosar who was just censured and stripped of all committee assignments because he posted a video depicting violence against women and our President. Mr. Gosar's censure is an embarrassment for Arizona and a loss to his constituents because he can no longer effectively represent their interests in Congress. Despite this, he will probably be re-elected in the new CD-2 because it leans so strongly Republican. Safe districts encourage extremists like Mr. Gosar to run for office because candidates only need appeal to their base.

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I don't want any safe districts in Arizona, Democrat or Republican. I want districts that are highly competitive because this will encourage moderates to run for office; and once elected, they will listen to all of their constituents and represent the interests of all Arizonans and not just their own political party.

19Moderate candidates will also increase turnout20because Arizonans can be assured that their votes truly21count.

22 Safe districts, on the other hand, oppress turnout 23 because why bother if their candidate has no chance to be 24 elected.

A proposed congressional map submitted by the

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Navajo Nation is competitive. Likewise the maps for Legislative District 6 and 7 that were submitted by the Coconino County Board of Supervisors leaves each legislative district highly competitive.

All three of these maps also honor the other five criteria for independent redistricting. I ask you to please adopt these maps. Thank you for listening to me and thank you for your service, Arizona redistricting.

MS. VAN HAREN: Thank you.

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10The next speaker is Charlene Nez followed by Laura11Huenneke.

Charlene, can you hear us? Charlene?

13 Let's move to Laura and then we'll see if we can 14 get Charlene on the line.

Laura, can you hear us?

16 SPEAKER HUENNEKE: Thank you for the opportunity to 17 provide input in your draft maps. I'm Laura Huenneke from 18 just outside Flagstaff. Today I would like to speak to the 19 overall statewide maps you're charged with drawing and go 20 back to this issue of political competitiveness.

The Commission was charged in Prop 106 with creating fair and competitive districts. You're to aim for competitiveness where to do so does not cause substantial detriment to the other criteria.

The maps we've been using for the past decade show

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it is possible to have many fairly competitive districts that have passed every legal challenge raised; that is, they've done a good job of meeting all the constitutional criteria. Your current draft maps are not better. In fact, in many respects, they're worse with respect to various criteria and they're terribly noncompetitive overall.

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Most awful I find is the draft legislative map. Of the 30 districts, 24 are noncompetitive. Using the selected metric of possible swing votes in the set of nine statewide elections, only five of the thirty show anything other than a zero to nine pattern. If your map's adopted, only 1.2 million out of the 7.1 million people in Arizona, 17 percent, would find themselves in a district with any chance of actual competition. When more than 80 percent of the voters might as well stay home on election day, your maps are not achieving the primary purpose of the IRC.

Please direct the mapping team to reexamine ways to increase the proportion of the State's population served by competitive districts and thank you for these opportunities to provide input.

MS. VAN HAREN: Thank you.

The next speaker is Charlene Nez. Charlene, can you hear us?
SPEAKER NEZ: Can you hear me?

MS. VAN HAREN: Yes. Please proceed.

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1 SPEAKER NEZ: Okay. Okay. Thank you. 2 I am Charlene Nez, a lifetime resident of 3 Tuba City, Arizona, and a member of the Navajo Nation. I am fiercely advocating that the Independent Redistricting 4 5 Commission support, adopt and approve the recommended draft 6 map submitted by the Navajo Human Rights Commission. This 7 draft provides a competitive and fair congressional election 8 in which my Dené people and other Native American people 9 from the area can fairly participate in, which was provided 10 to all Americans by the Voting Act of 1965. 11 In conclusion, thank you Commissioners for taking 12 the time to volunteer and participate on this very important 13 process that our State must take every ten years. 14 Thank you. 15 MS. VAN HAREN: Thank you. 16 Our next speaker is Dieter Knecht. Dieter, can you 17 hear us? 18 SPEAKER KNECHT: I would like to add my two bits on 19 this competitiveness. 20 Prop 106 which the voters wrote, they passed, they 21 charged your Commission to create fair and competitive 22 districts and then they list six criteria; unfortunately 23 they -- they put competitive at the end, which really is the 24 main one because what -- other speakers have said. 25 If you're not in a competitive district you

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essentially might as well write it off and you lose all those voters, both from the majority party a lot of them and from the minority party. You create the case where you -you have extreme people coming in like we have seen this last year who all of a sudden our -- our state senators --

(Vice Chair Watchman enters.)

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SPEAKER KNECHT: -- decide they need to challenge and re- -- really get a -- a forensic audit of the election by it turns out people who don't even understand the Arizona election laws. So we have people like that who have come into the legislature because we have this opportunity where there is highly uncompetitive districts, the -- the extreme people can start to come in through the primaries and that -- that's it.

So to me that -- this is the most important criteria and I -- I think your mapping team should have used this first. I think maybe they feel happy that they created 12 districts that are mainly one party and 11 districts that are the other party and some districts --

> MS. VAN HAREN: Thank you.

21 The next speaker is Mary Ellen. Mary Ellen, can 22 you hear us? 23 SPEAKER METZGER: I can, thank you. 24

MS. VAN HAREN: Wonderful.

SPEAKER METZGER: I'm coming to you as a second

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generation Native Arizonan. My family came to Arizona -that's okay.

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My family came to Arizona in 1920 and I was born in Nogales, Arizona, and have spent my entire life here. I've been an advocate for citizenship and citizenry, I've been an educator and I've seen the state go from having statesmen such as Carl Heyden and Barry Goldwater and also John McCain to a questionable anxiety that goes on in our -- in our electorate today.

I think what I see is that in the past few years we have actually seen some balance occur in our -- in our state voting, and when I look at the possibility of redistricting and restructuring and flipping everything upside down, I think it might also make sense just to stay where we are, to stay with the present districts that we have.

I know it's kind of strange to have a district that goes all the way from Flagstaff to Casa Grande. I've lived in both those places and I understand how people have a struggle with those two differences, but at the same time it's very valuable to have representation that looks at the entire state.

We have been able to see balance beginning to happen in our legislature and also at the congressional level, and to try to regenerate new plans I think might lead us to even more extremism that we've seen develop in our

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country and our state.

2 I've seen people flying flags that use foul 3 language against our president and the people who voted for I don't understand that kind of negativism. 4 him. Ι 5 understand people having differences of opinion and being, you know, excited about their opinion, but the vitriol we've 6 7 seen develop has been very heartbreaking. 8 And again as a second generation Native Arizonan, I 9 think this state has so much to offer in terms of 10 intelligence and the respect for our Native populations. Ι 11 think it's time for us to really make --12 MS. VAN HAREN: Thank you. 13 Our next speaker is Phyllis Schiller. Phyllis, can 14 you hear us? 15 SPEAKER SCHILLER: Yes, can you hear me? 16 MS. VAN HAREN: Yes, thank you. Please proceed. 17 SPEAKER SCHILLER: Okay. Good afternoon, 18 Commissioners. My name is Phyllis Schiller, and I am a 19 41-year resident of Flagstaff and retired professor from 20 I have two main issues with the current draft map. ASU. 21 CD-2 was a highly competitive district, now with the addition of Prescott and western Mohave County, it is 22 23 now solidly Republican. It's disenfranchised the many 24 Native American tribes who will not have representation 25 because of the dominant numbers in the Prescott metro area.

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The second issue is the LD District 6 and 7. It breaks up the greater Flagstaff metro area into two legislative districts, the Verde Valley into three districts, and Sedona into two districts. These new drafts creates communities of interest very unfairly.

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Recently a major TV network emanating from Phoenix referred to Representative Gosar who just got censured from the House of Representatives as being from Flagstaff. He represents the Prescott and western Arizona area, not Flagstaff; to me this shows the lack of understanding and interest in Northern Arizona from the Maricopa area and relegates the importance of our region to second-, even third-class status.

The Flagstaff metro area is the hub of Northern Arizona, it cannot and should not be divided into two districts. I implore the Commission to listen to and hear the concerns of many of us in Northern Arizona. Choose the map submitted by the Coconino County Board of Supervisors, they represent the fair interests of Northern Arizona.

They are endorsed unanimously by the city councils of Flagstaff and Sedona for both the congressional and legislative districts. These maps reflect economic and communities of interest in Northern Arizona while giving the Native American population an opportunity to elect candidates of --

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1 MS. VAN HAREN: Thank you. 2 The next speaker is Lisa Marshall. Lisa, Can you 3 hear us? 4 Let's move to Aubrey Sonderegger. Aubrey, can you 5 hear us? 6 SPEAKER SONDEREGGER: I can. Can you hear me? 7 MS. VAN HAREN: Yes. Please proceed. SPEAKER SONDEREGGER: Okay. I am speaking today on 8 9 behalf of a fellow member of Flagstaff, Mr. Daryl Marks 10 (phonetic) today. He is a member of the Navajo Nation and a 11 resident of Flagstaff. He was unable to attend today since 12 he is at work on midday on a Friday. I understand that 13 there are conflicts no matter when a meeting is held, but I 14 do feel that this meeting could have been scheduled at a 15 more accessible time. 16 Daryl wishes to lend his voice as supporting the 17 congressional map submitted by the Navajo Nation Human 18 Rights Commission, CDF010. This map offers a fair and 19 competitive option that does not compromise the Voting 20 Rights Act or any of the other requirements that this 21 Commission is required to adhere to. Our Native peoples deserve the right to represent -- have a chance to represent 22 23 people that will represent them and reflect their values in 24 our state. 25 And so we are advocating -- Daryl is advocating for

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the human right -- Navajo Nation Human Rights Commission 1 2 map. 3 Thank you very much for your time today. 4 MS. VAN HAREN: Thank you. Our next speaker is Fredi. Fredi, can you hear us? 5 6 SPEAKER HAMILTON: Yes, I can. 7 MS. VAN HAREN: Please proceed. 8 SPEAKER HAMILTON: My name is Fredi Hamilton, I 9 live in the village of Oak Creek. 10

A functioning democracy requires the push and pull of opposing points of view if it is to remain healthy. Proposition 106 was put in place to aid in that by ensuring that we have competitive voting districts. Such districts encourage candidates to debate the issues, hopefully find a middle ground that will attract the most voters to their point of view. That is the glory of our democracy.

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17 But your proposed maps of Northern Arizona are 18 weighted to favor only one side of the debates and it is for 19 that reason that I implore you to reconsider the lines you 20 Instead, follow the LDF50 and 51 maps so that have drawn. 21 we might guarantee robust debates and encourage candidates representing all sides of the issues to run for office in 22 23 our districts; otherwise, we risk cutting the very heart out 24 of our democracy and then we could all find ourselves 25 traveling down some very dangerous paths in this country.

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1 The fate of our democracy is in your hands. Ι 2 thank you. 3 MS. VAN HAREN: Thank you. 4 Our next speaker is Deborah Dyjak. Deborah, can 5 you hear us? (No audible response.) 6 SPEAKER DYJAK: 7 MS. VAN HAREN: Yes, please proceed. 8 SPEAKER DYJAK: Hello, my name is Deborah Jean 9 Dyjack, I live in Maricopa County. So I've never done this before, I apologize because I couldn't get on the meetings 10 11 here locally so they said I could join this one. Native 12 Arizonan and I'm here today to give you information just 13 about my community of interest. 14 So I actually live near the 101 and Baseline on the 15 west side of Dobson Ranch which is a neighborhood and it's 16 comprised of three different precincts in Legislative 17 District 18. So my community here currently is made up 18 mostly of single-family homes although there is obviously 19 some, you know, apartments and condominiums with very active 20 neighbors, very healthy neighbors; they like to get out and 21 walk and ride bikes and things like that. They mostly know each other and they're very committed to helping each other 22 23 out. I notice that most people do take their own cars and 24 there's a lot of local businesses close by and those are 25 patronized by my neighbors.

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So in terms of my community of interest, I know 1 2 there's talk about changing Legislative District 18. Ι 3 definitely utilize, like, the Tempe Town Lakes area, the mall, the Tempe mall there along the 202, the Chandler mall 4 5 along the 101; I usually travel about as far south as like the 202 and maybe slightly beyond. That's kind of the area 6 7 of my interest, you know, the kind of to the north, south, 8 east and west. Most of my doctors and dentists are in 9 Chandler or maybe as far east as Country Club in Mesa. 10 So because many stores and businesses are so 11 readily available, I really don't have to travel that far, 12 although I do travel into Maryvale for church, but usually 13 I'm kind of in those areas, like I-10, Broadway, Country 14 Club and maybe the 202 to the south. 15 And so I look at that area as community of 16 interest. I would appreciate the Dobson Ranch community and 17 maybe Tempe Lakes community where I used to live kind of 18 being kept in --19 MS. VAN HAREN: Thank you. 20 The next speaker is Lisa Marshall. Lisa, can you 21 hear us? Lisa, we see that you're unmuted. Lisa, can you 22 hear us? 23 Okay. We'll come back to Lisa. 24 There's another speaker. Linda Edgar, who we don't 25 have -- I'm sorry, Sharon Edgar. We don't have a microphone

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1 next to us so we can't unmute you. Sharon, if you could log 2 back in with a computer or phone that has a microphone so 3 that we can hear you, that would be great. And then I think our next speaker is -- I believe 4 5 Austin Aslan was on the line. Austin? Can you unmute 6 vourself? 7 All right. Austin, go ahead. 8 SPEAKER ASLAN: Me? 9 MS. VAN HAREN: Yep. Please proceed. 10 SPEAKER ASLAN: Wonderful. Thank you. 11 So I'm Austin Aslan, I'm a Flagstaff City Council 12 I'm also the chair of the Coconino Plateau Water member. 13 Advisory Council, which is a large and diverse body of 14 stakeholders and experts up here in Northern Arizona. Ι 15 want to thank you all very much for your service and for the 16 hard work that you're doing. 17 I think it's really important that you guys do not 18 put Prescott and Flagstaff in the same congressional 19 districts. I actually grew up in Prescott and now I'm a 20 long-term resident of Flagstaff, and I love both 21 communities, and they're both great assets to the State of 22 Arizona; but from my personal experience, Prescott and 23 Flagstaff are entirely incompatible and would present 24 enormous challenges for any congressperson constantly trying to reconcile vastly opposing issues and values. 25

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This is particularly true from a water perspective. Prescott is ruled by a groundwater active management district that is failing and Flagstaff is not ruled by an active management district but is voluntarily enacting, to great success, its own management efforts.

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I'd like to say something personally to you guys. You know, making incredibly strong partisan districts creates a cognitive dissonance between what local constituents are asking for and what far off political powers dictate. We run a very real risk of encouraging extremism when our parties' primaries decide elections.

You know, right now we've got a guy from Lord knows where waiting until this process was done to swoop in here and plant a flag to run for the district. He's eyeing the district because the way it's proposed he'll waltz into office.

This -- is that kind of outsider going to understand the tribal needs of our region, our water issues, the vastly different forest health concerns between Prescott and the peaks? Is that what we want for Northern Arizona? Is that in the best interest of Republicans, for Democrats? Is that the kind of choice Independents want for about a third of the state everywhere?

So this country is tearing itself apart right now and we need to be mindful and thoughtful about creating

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districts that create an opportunity for healing and actual dialogue. That's not going to happen in front of the television cable news channels. It's not going to happen unless our politicians are forced to wrestle with the nuances and overlaps that exist in our politics. You guys are doing this role because --

MS. VAN HAREN: Thank you.

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Our next speaker is Sharon Edgar. Sharon, can you hear?

SPEAKER EDGAR: Yes, can you hear me? MS. VAN HAREN: Yes. Please proceed.

SPEAKER EDGAR: My name is Sharon Edgar. I live in Flagstaff, I agree with everything Austin just said. I also want to echo the sentiments of my friends in Sedona, Verde Valley, and Oak Creek.

Our community of interest has a sense of stewardship for our residents and our natural surroundings. We share the same housing, workforce, water, and healthforce -- health issues. We belong in the same legislative district.

Please consider legislative district maps LDF0050 and LDF0051. Those LD-6 and LD-7 maps were submitted by the Coconino County Board of Supervisors on October 27th and unanimously endorsed by the city councils by Flagstaff, Sedona, and Clarkdale. LDF0051 meets the Voting Rights Act

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requirement to not dilute votes of a minority community that would be unable to elect candidates of their choosing because of racially polarized bloc voting. It also does not pack that district with voters, including Native American voters, who can make a neighboring district competitive.

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In the draft map, LD-6 has a vote spread of over 42 percent, the neighboring LD-7 has a vote spread of almost 30 percent. High vote spreads like 42 percent and 30 percent discourage voting. Those districts should be drawn to be more competitive.

The Coconino County map has a vote spread of 15.84 percent for Native American voting rights district, and less than 1 percent for a competitive Republican --Republican neighboring district.

Please give LDF0050 and LD 5501 some consideration. Thank you very much. I appreciate your service to all of Arizona.

MS. VAN HAREN: Thank you.

19Our next speaker is Dawn Schackner. Dawn, can you20hear us?

21 SPEAKER SCHACKNER: Yeah, can you hear me?
22 MS. VAN HAREN: Yes. Please proceed.
23 SPEAKER SCHACKNER: Okay, hi, my name's Dawn
24 Schackner, I live in Doney Park area of Flagstaff. I'm
25 speaking in behalf of myself.

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I'm respectfully asking the Commission to consider adopting the Navajo Nation Human Rights draft proposal and here are the reasons why.

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When the IRC Commission was formed, my understanding of the criteria was that to the extent possible competitive districts should be favored when to do so would create no significant detriments to the other goals.

The proposed draft map takes a highly competitive district and makes it noncompetitive to the detriment of Native Americans without justification.

Native Americans deserve to have a voice.

If a party is sure to win, why would we want to vote? Don't we want all Arizonans to be engaged? Competition means that candidates must pay attention to all of their constituents. While one party is sure to win, the representative can ignore constituents outside their party.

18 I ask the Commission to strongly consider the 19 Navajo Nation Human Rights Commission proposal known as 20 CDF010.

I thank the Commission for hearing our concerns and for their very hard work in making these most difficult decisions.

Thank you.

MS. VAN HAREN: Thank you.

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The next speaker is Cora Phillips. Cora, can you hear us?

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SPEAKER PHILLIPS: Yes, can you hear me? MS. VAN HAREN: Yes. Please proceed.

SPEAKER PHILLIPS: Yes. Thank you very much. My name is Cora Phillips from Navajo Nation and I serve on the Navajo Nation Human Rights Commission; and I speak for the Navajo people who don't have Internet capacity, for those elders who are unable to speak English language but who have been faithful voters, and lastly for our veterans who believe and fought for America's democratic principles of fairness and justice.

Congressional District 2 has the largest concentration of Native American votes in the United States, and I strongly believe that we deserve a chance to elect congressional representation who will truly represent our interests, and a competitive district will certainly give us that chance or opportunity.

A majority of registered Democrats and in the proposed district map the represent- -- the representative will be chosen in the Republican primary. This will surely diminish our voice, creating a significant detriment to being part of a fair and competitive map.

Competition basically means that candidates must pay attention to all their constituents. Where one party is

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certainly -- will win -- they know they will win, their 1 2 representative can also give -- or ignore constituents 3 outside of their party. The draft map has taken a highly competitive 4 5 district and it's really unfair to make it solidly 6 Republican. 7 This is not necessary to accommodate the other five 8 constitutional criteria. The addition of all of Yavapai 9 County to Congressional District 2 will rigorously dilute the voting power of Native Americans. 10 I fully support the congressional map submitted by 11 12 the Navajo Nation and please redraw the district lines for 13 Congressional District number 2. 14 Thank you very much. 15 MS. VAN HAREN: Thank you. 16 Our next speaker is Rennae Ward. Rennae, can you 17 hear us? 18 Rennae, can you hear us? We can hear you. 19 SPEAKER WARD: Now can you hear me? 20 MS. VAN HAREN: Yes. Please proceed. 21 SPEAKER WARD: Okay. Technical difficulty there. I agree with the last speaker and I would like -- I 22 23 am currently -- the way that District 9 is set up, I live in 24 Maricopa County, I live in the area of north 25 Peoria/Vistancia near the 17 and 303 freeway where there's

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an enormous amount of construction and building that's going on and we are probably, if not the fastest growing area of Arizona, we are pretty close to it.

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We have been included in District 9, congressional 4 5 district, and we do not resemble any of that district whatsoever; that is a very rural district. We do our 6 7 shopping and schools and all of that in Peoria and Glendale 8 and Sun City; and I would advocate that we are nothing like 9 Wickenburg or Prescott. That maybe instead of having Prescott in District 5 it should be moved to District 9 10 11 which is rural, as is Prescott, and much of that area in 12 that -- the area around Prescott. I know Prescott is up and 13 moving, too, but it still is, in my mind anyway, a rural 14 area of the -- of the state and definitely my area, District 28, is not --15 16 MS. VAN HAREN: Thank you. 17 Our next speaker is Kristie Blackman. Kristie, can 18 you hear us? 19 Kristie? 20 SPEAKER BLACKMAN: (No audible response.) 21 MS. VAN HAREN: Yes. Please proceed. 22 SPEAKER BLACKMAN: Hi. So I wanted to talk to you 23 about District 6 and District 7. I would like to definitely 24 keep Flagstaff in District 6. If you look at the Navajo Nation, they had a massive loss of 40,000 citizens that left 25

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the Navajo Nation according to the census, which puts -puts that -- that's why they're having to recount and get other areas in both the congressional district and also the legislative district.

But there is a large population of indigenous in Flagstaff, many of them shop in Flagstaff. We over here in Navajo County over by Snowflake/Pinetop/Lakeside, we tend to stay over here. We do most of our shopping up in Pinetop, up in Snowflake, or even going to the Valley; rarely do we go to Flagstaff.

So I am a proponent of keeping Flagstaff with District 6 and I also am -- love the way you have Congressional District 2 set up.

Thank you.

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MS. VAN HAREN: Thank you.

And Commissioner Mehl, that was our last speaker for now that is logged in. I think we are all set.

COMMISSIONER MEHL: Well, we certainly want to thank everyone who spoke today and thanks for the incredible amount of input that we have been getting throughout these different meetings we've had.
